### 1. WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS, APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Maryanne Kempf, Chair, welcomed all to the meeting.

#### 2. PRIMARY SCHOOL PLACES

The Chair on behalf of the Partnership welcomed Councillor Clare Campion-Smith, Executive Member for Children and Young People and Craig Bolt, Service Director, Education Strategy and Targeted Support, who gave a short overview of the current position in relation to Primary School places across the City and in the Neighbourhood Partnership Area.

Councillor Campion-Smith commented that the Cabinet at its meeting on 15 December 2011 approved the following:

- the allocation of £37.1m of capital resources to provide additional primary pupil places for September 2012 as outlined in the report, in addition to the £20.9m already approved (21<sup>st</sup> July Cabinet Report).
- the Strategic Director, Children, Young People & Skills be authorised, in consultation with the Executive Members for Children & Young People and Capital Programme to confirm the scope of additional building works in relation to provision for September 2012 and the award of construction contracts estimated at £58.0m; and
- the Strategic Director, Corporate Services, in consultation with the Executive Member for Housing, Property Services and Regeneration be authorised to conclude land and property acquisitions to secure suitable premises for additional school provision.

During detailed discussion the following points were highlighted:

- the Partnership noted that it was anticipated that £11.5m from the £58m would be spent in the Neighbourhood Partnership Area;
- It was reported that there were 614 applications for primary school places and that 600 places were available for allocation;
- It was confirmed that there were no sites designated for closure in the Neighbourhood Partnership area;
- Consideration would be given to whether the former chocolate factory site could be used for school purposes; and
- Several members commented on the importance of schools as one of the contributing factors to community cohesion, and the impact for communities when children are not allocated their nearest school of choice:

ACTION: It was agreed that any further questions could be submitted to the Neighbourhood Manager, for submission to the Executive Member.

#### 3. YOUTH LINKS

Councillor Clare Campion-Smith, Executive Member for Children and Young People and Craig Bolt, Service Director, Education Strategy and Targeted Support, who gave a short overview of the current position in relation to Youth Links Service across the City and in the Neighbourhood Partnership Area.

During detailed discussion the following points were highlighted:

- Craig Bolt indicated that the intention of the Bristol Youth Links Commissioning process is:
  - to provide an integrated service offer for children and young people, so as to reduce disruption at transition points and ensure that the needs of children and young peeople are paramount:
  - o to develop effective and meaningful relationships with a reduced number of providers so as to ensure consistency and quality of provision;
  - to provide surety and stability by putting in place up to 5 year contract arrangements. Not only would this signal approximately £20m of direct investment at a time when many other council areas are taking different approaches, providing this level of certainty should also enable providers to attract investment from other sources;
  - There are no plans to close council run adventure playgrounds and youth centres. The proposed commissioning process will enable organisations to come forward with ideas about how to

run local services. Existing centres and facilities will continue to be available to organisations to use. Organisations may say that they can offer a better service by working in other places. The process will enable the council to listen to their ideas; and

- Set out the commissioning timetable where it was anticipated that implementation of the new service would commence in Autumn 2012;
- The Neighbourhood Partnership asked following representations from a young person, that consideration be given to how the voices from a greater number of young people could be engaged in the process;
- Several members sought clarification on the transitional arrangements for youth services particularly in the period April – September 2012; and
- It was noted that an in-house team would continue to be operational during this period.

ACTION: It was agreed that any further questions could be submitted to the Neighbourhood Manager, for submission to the Executive Member.

## 4. MINUTES OF THE NEIGHBOURHOOD PARTNERSHIP HELD ON 14<sup>TH</sup> DECEMBER 2011

AGREED: that the minutes of the meeting held on 14<sup>th</sup> December 2011 were confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

#### 5. CHAIR'S BUSINESS

#### (A) PARTNERSHIP CHAIR ELECTION

The Partnership was asked to note that elections would take place at the Annual Meeting of the Partnership in June 2012.

## (B) BRISTOL MAYORAL REFERENDUM

In response to a referendum debate which had been organised by University of Bristol on 22 February 2012, at the Council House, The Chair, sought agreement from the partnership for a referendum debate to be held in the Neighbourhood Partnership.

AGREED: that a debate be organised.

# (C) NEIGHBOURHOOD PARTNERSHIP/NEIGHBOURHOOD COMMITTEE

It was agreed that discussion be held at a future meeting on the use of the terms Neighbourhood Partnership and Neighbourhood Committee, as part of the neighbourhood arrangement for the future.

# 6. RETAIL CHAIN MEMBER OF THE NEIGHBOURHOOD PARTNERSHIP

The Neighbourhood Partnership considered a report of Mike Taylor, neighbourhood partnership resident member (Agenda Item No. 5).

It was noted that Abdul Malik had also undertaken some work since the last meeting, and would be submitting his proposals to a future meeting.

It was noted that further work would need to be undertaken to look at appropriate criteria for the selection of a retail chain representative.

#### ACTION:

ideas for inclusion and consideration as part of the criteria, should be sent to the Neighbourhood Manager, as soon as possible for collation, and consideration at a future meeting of the Neighbourhood Partnership.

### 6. UPDATE - AREA CO-ORDINATOR

The Neighbourhood Partnership considered a report of Penny Germon, Neighbourhood Manager, Neighbourhoods & Communities, Neighbourhoods Directorate (Agenda Item No. 6) giving an update on the following issues since the last meeting.

Councillor Kiely in welcoming the report, and particularly the highlighted the issues which had been resolved, asked officers to consider subdiving the existing heading for future reports to assist with targeting challenges across the Partnership area.

The Partnership also noted the excellent work being undertaken by the Stapleton Road Working Group, and that a letter from the Partnership be sent to the Group.

#### RESOLVED:

- (i) That the report and the "You Said, We Did" summary report be noted;
- (ii) That a letter be sent congratulating the Stapleton Road Working on their achievements to date.

#### 7. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Cllr Rogers declared that he was a member of the mangement Committee of Full Circle.

Councillors Choudhury and Kiely declared that they are members of the King George V Memorial Trust.

#### 8. THE BEARPIT

The Neighbourhood partnership considered a report of Andrew Whitehead, Principal Officer, City Transport and Richard Fletcher, Environment and Leisure (Agenda Item No. 8) regarding the Bearpit.

During detailed discussion of the scheme the following issues were highlighted:

- The St James Barton roundabout is not in the Ashley, Easton and Lawrence hill area, but is in the Cabot, Clifton and Clifton East Neighbourhood Partnership area;
- Section 106 allocation will be administered by the City Council with all the associated project and procurement tasks taken forward by City Development and Neighbourhoods;
- Delivering a successful phase one project would require planning approval;
- Several members of the Partnership sought clarification on whether contributions has been received from the local business surrounding the bearpit;

Following a detailed discussion Councillor Rogers moved the following motion, which was seconded by Councillor Hoyt:

That the Committee allocate upto 33.3% of the develoved parks and recreation S106 income to the first phase of the Bear Pit project, with the remaining 66.7% coming from the Cabot, Clifton and Clifton East Neighbourhood Partnership.

This was put to the vote and LOST 2 voting for the motion and 3 voting against the motion.

Councillor Kiely moved the following amendment to the motion, which was seconded by Councillor Choudhury, which was

#### RESOLVED:

(1) That in the first instance, local businesses within the vicinity of The Bear Pit be approached to ascertain whether they would be willing to fund all or part of the proposed

#### improvements to The Bear Pit;

- (2) that the Partnership reviews its allocated Section 106 monies against its identified priorities for Parks and Recreation, and any funds would cannot be used against those priorities can be released for the Bear Pit project;
- (3) That in the event of commercial support not being forthcoming, then Phase 1 of the proposed works be funded through (a) use of 33.3% (£22,500) of the Partnership's devolved S106 monies for parks and recreation, and (b) that the Cabot, Clifton and Clifton East Neighbourhood Partnership be approached to see if it would be willing to provide the remaining 66.7% (£67,500), and
- (4) That if necessary, a further update on the funding situation be presented at the next meeting.

# 9. PARKS AND GREEN SPACES INVESTMENT PLAN PRIORITIES FOR 2012/13

The Neighbourhood Partnership considered a report of Richard Fletcher, Environment and Leisure (Agenda Item No. 9) regarding parks and green spaces investment plan priorities for 2012/13.

#### **RESOLVED:**

- (1) that officers be formally instructed to take forward in 2012/13 the following high priority park investment projects adopted by the committee at its meeting in December 2011:
  - Play are at 'Proctor House'
  - Play area at 'Brook Street'
  - Play area at Bellevue Road open space
  - Joint park and highway improvements at Albany Green Park
  - Young people's wheels park at Eastgate M32
  - A new play area at St. Judes is current being delivered
  - The 'Bearpit' improvement project
- (2) that Neighbourhood Partnership approved S106 improvements made to children's play and refurbishment of public toilets at St Andrews Park
