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RECOMMENDATION

That the Audit Committee note the progress reported, the update on the allocation of public funds and external sponsorship to Bristol 2015 Ltd and the arrangements being made for end of year reporting.

SUMMARY

This report provides a progress report relating to Bristol Green Capital 2015, a summary of activity for the remainder of the year and an update on the latest financial position for Bristol 2015 Ltd. It also sets out the arrangements for end of year reporting.

Key items included in the report are:

- An update on progress by Internal Audit
- An update on programme activity to date
- A summary of key programme elements during the remainder of 2015
- An update of the allocation of public funds received from Department of Energy and Climate Change

1. Introduction

- 1.1 At the Audit Committee meeting on 24th April 2015, Members noted the governance arrangements in place in relation to Bristol 2015 Ltd and the financial update on the allocation of public funds and external sponsorship to Bristol 2015 Ltd.
- 1.2 This report provides an update on progress by Internal Audit, details of 2015 Ltd programme delivery to date and activity for the remainder of the year, updates on allocation of public and sponsorship funding and arrangements for end of year reporting.

2. Internal Audit

- 2.1 Since the Audit Committee meeting in April Internal Audit have carried out the first and second stage of their review of Bristol 2015 Ltd.
- 2.2 Stage One focused on the following:
 - Overall Governance and Operating environment of Bristol 2015 Ltd
 - Regulations, policies relating to financial control, procurement and adherence
 - Adherence to financial reporting requirements in line with Memorandum Of Understanding (MOU)
 - Internal financial reconciliations between Bristol 2015 Ltd & Bristol City Council
- 2.3 On completion of Stage One Internal Audit reported that acceptable controls are in place. The level of corporate risk of this area is evaluated as impact marginal, likelihood possible, and falls in the green area on the Corporate Risk Management Grid.
- 2.4 Stage Two focused on the following:
 - Budgetary control and review.
 - Providing assurance that the Business & City Leadership Summits will proceed as planned.
 - Regulations, policies relating to financial control, procurement and adherence.
- 2.5 On completion of Stage Two Internal Audit reported that good controls are in place. The level of corporate risk of this area is evaluated as impact significant, likelihood unlikely, and falls in the green area on the Corporate Risk Matrix.

3. Programme Activity to Date

- 3.1 We are now past the half-way point of the year and Bristol 2015 Ltd have delivered a number of key events and activities, as set out in the contract. Attention is drawn to key programme elements including:
 - Official opening events in January, with a series of tailored events for EU

- and international visitors, and an opening public show.
- Launch of Go Green business engagement scheme. This provides support to businesses across all sectors and sizes in a programme that will extend beyond 2015.
- Opening of the Lab Space at the Bristol 2015 Ltd offices on Bristol
 Harbourside, providing a base for a number of events and activities during the
 year, such as the Sustainable Shaun the Sheep game and education
 programme.
- 1000 young people attended **Green Youth Day** on 20th April to discuss the science of climate change; protecting wildlife and the oceans; human rights; the clothes we wear; equality; successful campaigning and why questioning the establishment is essential.
- The Digital Challenge Award winner was announced at Green Youth Day. Crocodile, the winning team, will develop an app that will enable parents to identify a walking bus route, book their child a place, check progress and confirm that their child has arrived at school safely.
- Neighbourhood Arts Projects have been commissioned across the City.
- The Bristol 2015 **Schools Programme** launched on 1st May. This is a three year programme of work which will be available to schools nationally. An online platform will be launched later in the year to provide teaching resources.
- The European Green Capital Awards for 2017 took place in June, with the award being presented to Essen. We welcomed over 150 delegates from across the EU to Bristol and hosted the team from the European Commission.
- July saw the launch of a free online game, Sustainable Shaun. A key element of the national schools programme, designed by the Bristol 2015 education team and created by Aardman Animations. The game has subsequently been nominated for a national award.
- August saw a Green Capital presence at the Bristol International Balloon
 Fiesta with the launch of the first certified Solar Air Balloon, a hybrid aircraft,
 partially powered by the sun and partially powered by a conventional propane
 burner.
- September saw the launch of Refill Bristol, an initiative aiming to make drinking water available on every city centre street within six months through a voluntary network of cafes, retailers, hotels and local businesses.
- October saw the **Business Summit** and **City Leader Summit** at the Passenger Shed with a range of speakers including the Astronomer Royal.
- Ongoing public engagement has continued throughout the year with the Do15 Campaign.
- November will see the last two projects funded by an Arts Council
 Exceptional (ACE) Award, Theaster Gates' Sanctum and the Festival of the
 Future City. The other ACE funded projects were Luke Jerram's Withdrawn,
 Richard Long, Time and Space, Arcadia Spectacular and The Bristol Whales.
- 3.2 In the first half of the year Bristol 2015 Ltd estimated their reach had been:
 - 200,000 people engaged with events, art and cultural activities
 - 189 sustainable projects across the city supported by funding
 - 7,000 school children engaged in Bristol's schools and 1,000 young people attending Green Youth Day

- 1,600 people and over 100 companies hosted at Venturefest, showcasing Green Technologies
- Over 800 businesses engaged with Go Green
- 87,000 unique visitors to the Bristol 2015 website
- 430,000 page views, 6k twitter followers, 4,800 Facebook likes

4. Activity during the Remainder of 2015

4.1 The key programme elements for the remainder of the year include:

• 18 – 20 Nov 2015: Festival of the Future City

• 30 Nov – 11 Dec 16: Bristol hosting the Local Government Pavilion at

COP21, Paris

• 9th February 2016: Handover to Ljubljana (in Brussels)

5. Update on Allocation of Public Funds

5.1 BCC and Bristol 2015 Ltd have jointly reviewed the current allocation of funding from the Department of Energy & Climate Change in light of the emerging programme and the opportunities offered through commercial sponsorship. A small re-profile to the original budget allocation has been agreed with DECC. This sees an increase in allocations to the Schools Programme, Local Funding and Public Awareness. This has been enabled largely due to commercial support for VentureFest/GreenTech and the Bristol Method. The total forecast spend of DECC funding remains £7m. Full details are included in Appendix A to this report with Spend to Date reported in Appendix B.

6. Sponsorship

- 6.1 To date, £1.8m in financial sponsorship has been secured with major sponsors, including Skanska, KPMG, First Group and Arup.
- 6.2 In addition to the financial sponsorship, £2.1m has been contributed as Value in Kind.

7. End of Year Reporting Arrangements

- 7.1 We will be producing the following end of year reports:
 - January 2016: Interim end-of-year report to the Department of Energy & Climate Change
 - March 2016: An end of year review which will be presented to the EU Commission and DECC, as well as local stakeholders
 - June 2020: Five year impact review, for local stakeholders and the EU Commission
- 7.2 An OSMB Enquiry Day is to be scheduled for March 2016, which will provide an opportunity to review the year and look at how the council can build on activity to ensure long term benefits
