Title: Neighbourhood Partnership Waste Plan

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This report is from the Area Environment Officer. It is for information.

Neighbourhood Partnership members are asked to note the Waste and Environment Plan produced at the areas forums held over a number of weeks last summer. See Appendix A.

Background

At the NP meeting of 21st June 2013, it was highlighted that Bristol's waste contractor May Gurney had agreed to work with Bristol City Council to develop Neighbourhood Waste Plans that address local waste and street scene issues.

The Waste Plan sets out how May Gurney and the Council will work with the NP, local residents and community-based organisations to ensure that service delivery is focussed on local priorities within the Partnership.

At a number of forum meetings held over September 2013, the Avonmouth and Kingsweston Area Neighbourhood Partnership's Environment Subgroup produced the Waste Plan.

The meeting agreed the following three priorities would form the basis of the Avonmouth and Kingsweston Area Neighbourhood Partnership, Waste Plan:

- 1. Identify hot spots for graffiti, bins on streets, dog fouling, fly tipping, weeds, and street cleansing issues, overflowing bins in NP area.
- **2.** Managing graffiti, bins on streets, dog fouling, fly tipping, weeds, street cleansing issues, overflowing bins in NP area

3. On-going performance monitoring of hot spots for graffiti, bins on streets, dog fouling, fly tipping, weeds, and street cleansing issues, overflowing bins

It was also agreed to run an environmental communications campaign focused on 'Managing Waste & Recycling More Effectively' across the NP area.

This campaign will be targeted at reducing street littering and fly tipping and improving recycling rates. Which should in turn achieve a reduction in complaints received through the Customer Service Centre.

- Localised messages delivered with the waste collection calendar.
- Positive articles on priority achievements by the Neighbourhood Partnership and the local May Gurney crews published on the Neighbourhood Partnership web site and at Neighbourhood Partnership Public Forums.
- Waste Doctors directed to tackle low recycling areas, in particular where recycling containers are constantly left on the street and fly tipping hotspots.

We will collect up to three bulky items at a charge of £15. All additional items will be charged at the same rate.

•Up to three items £15.

•Four to six items £30.

•Seven to nine items £45.

If residents receive one or more of the following benefits they are entitled to one free bulky waste collection of up to three items every six months:

- •Income support.
- •Housing benefits.
- •Guaranteed pension credits.
- •Means tested council tax benefits.

We will collect the following bulky items on this collection service:

- •Fridges and freezers
- •Washing machines

•Furniture.

•Mattresses.

•Electrical items (including TVs).

We are unable to collect the following items:

- •Paint and other liquids.
- •Any item over six feet in length.
- •Any item that cannot be carried by two people.
- •Car parts and tyres.

•Chemicals.

- •Engine oil (place next to your black box in a sealed container).
- •Asbestos (can be taken to Household Waste Recycling Centres (tips)).
- •Building waste (including rubble and hardcore).

•Business waste (this includes furniture owned by the landlord of a rented property).

•Heavily soiled items.
