Updates and information:

BCC Budget. The Council's budget discussion has started. If you want more information, or wish to contribute your thoughts, go to:

Leaves and snow. You are welcome to clear ice and snow from outside your house. Please do not believe the story that you are liable to be sued if you do and someone gets injured. Also, if gullies and drains in your street are blocked by leaves, please clear them. If you wish to be a snow warden, training can be provided. See the BCC website.

A member of the public wants a grit bin in their road. There is a map on the BCC website showing where the bins are. There are 750 grit bins across the city. Go to:

Police updates: There have been big changes in the police structure in Bristol. Cotham, along with the rest of the NP and Clifton, is now run from Southmead station. There will be an area manager rather than an Inspector. The review of boundaries has implications. The boundary consultation has now started. Bike theft is down 48%; Car theft is down; ASB down 2.3%.

You are still welcome to become a Community Speedwatch volunteer. We now have new equipment, and training can be organised. We currently have 6 Cotham volunteers.

Drug dealing in Cotham Gardens is being investigated. Appears to be mainly nitrous oxide, and some cannabis. Nitrous oxide isn't illegal. There have been reports of drug dealing by local pupils.

Reporting of crimes is more complicated than it appears. When changes are made to how forces count crime, some appear to improve, others decline. Also, some reports are not counted as crimes, or their definition is not what you might think. It is thought that approximately 1 in 10 crimes are reported to the police.

A resident informed the meeting that in Birmingham, a scheme has started to breathalyse people entering night clubs. If they are over a certain limit, entrance is refused. Could this be done here? It was suggested that this could be put on the

next agenda.

Libraries Review: Runs until 2nd February. The service needs to save approximately 20% of the current budget by 2016. But the review also offers an opportunity to change how the service is delivered. There have been numerous fundamental changes that affect libraries. These include e-books, Amazon (and other online retailers), web use etc. The library service wants to react to these changes and remain relevant.

The consultation is in two parts. This part ends on 2nd February 2015. A report will then go to Cabinet, which will decide on the new structure and changes. This will then go out to further consultation.

Approximately 15% of Bristol residents use libraries, and 6% use them regularly. But we also need to hear from those who don't use libraries. The ways you can give your thoughts are: online survey, paper survey, postcards, consultation meetings, an 'ideas bank', Facebook, twitter. 2,000 responses have already been received.

Questions: How can we best contribute? If you have ideas, best go to the ideas bank. Others can then see the comments and you can start a debate

Is there a danger that by asking people, it will lead to greater costs for the Library service? No, but it might lead us down new routes such as sharing of services and facilities, which will increase income, which can offset savings.

Are certain libraries earmarked for closure? Absolutely not. This consultation is a blank canvas. We are open to all ideas. We want it to be a genuine conversation.

Are staff the greatest cost to libraries? Yes. They account for approximately 80% of the library service's budget.

Can communities talk specifically about their local libraries in this consultation? Yes, we welcome this. We will look at each library individually.

Other comments: Auto systems in libraries are working well; work on the new Gloucester Road Library is finally starting again and it should be open by Spring 2015.

Grounds Maintenance. The consultation on this contract has been delayed until March 2015. This is due to the complexities of bringing this contract 'in-house' in to BCC in February 2015. (See section 3 of this report)

Festival. The BCR festival has been held for the last two years. It comprises numerous events and activities. It is an important way for the NP to promote itself in the local community. It will take place in early May, usually alongside the Redland May Fair. The Communications and Engagement Group of the NP organises the event. We are looking for volunteers to help us. If you are interested, please let us know. It's hard work but great fun. And very rewarding.

Green Capital. Roger Gimson, NP rep, informed the meeting that the £10k BCR NP Green Capital grants fund has had £23k of requests from 9 applicants. These are still being sifted. It is possible that some of the requests could be funded elsewhere in the NP area. The recommendations for funding will go to the NP in January.

Travel West. Give sustainable transport advice to individuals and employers, mainly about getting to and from work. Can include advice on parking, public transport, sustainable options.

Colston's School Annexe. Proposals to widen the pavement appear to be an inadequate response to the need to slow traffic past the new build. This is a narrow road and two-way. The traffic here, especially at rush hour, is also pretty awful. Unfortunately, with the enlargement of the Dolphin Primary School on Cheltenham Road, the situation is going to become considerably worse as it is proposed that traffic coming down the Cheltenham Road will be prevented from turning left in to Bath Buildings, where the school entrance will be located. This means that cars wishing to drop off at the Dolphin school, will have to come down Arley Hill and go straight across Cheltenham Road. This will severely exacerbate an already appalling traffic situation in Cotham ward. Cllr Negus will be investigating whether Highways Planning officers have considered the impact of these changes on the residents and commuters coming through this part of Cotham, when he meets with officers in the coming weeks. The meeting showed its support for Cllr Negus's wish to prevent these problems occurring.

Street Cleaning. The contract appears to have broken down. Sweeps are either non-existent or infrequent. The crossing near Blackboy Hill has become a fly-tipping spot, but there are other hotspots as well. So far no enforcement action has been taken.

Any Other Business

A consultation event is soon to be held regarding the development of Queen Victoria House on Redland Hill. There is particular concern for the garden, which is a beautiful space in the ward.

The meeting was informed that there will be a tree planting event in Cotham Gardens in January. You are welcome to get involved.

Issues:

When will the post office at the back of Tesco on Blackboy Hill be re-opened? Should be soon. It was closed due to flooding from the property above.

Updates and information:

Resident Parking Scheme update: Jon Toy of BCC Highways Department gave an update on the RPZ for Redland. Residents have mostly taken up their permits. There are usually 2 spikes in applications – when the scheme starts and when the students return in October. There have been reports of residents still awaiting their permits. Jon agreed to follow this up as this shouldn't be the case. On the issue of additional permits, applicants can have up to 100 in one year, 50 of which are free and 50 costing £1 each. Each of these can be used for a day and can be swapped between cars. People with carer needs can have permits that can be used on any cars used by carers.

The scheme's operating time will remain 9am – 5pm, in order to avoid shift commuters. Permits cannot be used on the Whiteladies Road. This operates a pay and display system. Traders appear to prefer the pay and display option as it means a greater turnover of customers. On Cotham Hill they would like it extended to Saturdays. With the review, it is possible that there can be small changes in roads included in the scheme, but only to deal with very specific problems. Where more profound changes are identified, it can be a lengthy process to get changes due to the need for consultation and TRO enactment.

Travel West gave a brief presentation. They are a regional group that aims to give advice to citizens on the best way to get about, particularly going to and from work. The offer includes advice to employers, bike loan scheme, corporate discounts on bus passes etc. Anyone with an interest was invited to talk to the reps at the breakout session.

Libraries consultation. The consultation runs from 11th November 2014 to 2nd February 2015. Approximately 15% of the Bristol population uses the library service. There are 28 libraries in the city. Book borrowing has declined and new uses for libraries are emerging. The service needs to save £1.1million but needs to review its services anyway. Sharing of facilities or improved income generation could be used to off-set the savings needed. As residents you can contribute online. Green Capital update: Each NP received £10k to provide grants to local groups with ideas for local action. BCR had 9 applications totalling £23k. The NP panel is currently adjudicating on these and will make recommendations to the NP in January. This NP will not now receive extra funding as it has been decided that wards with higher deprivation indicators will receive the money. At this point, a rep from the **Green Capital Neighbourhood Arts Programme** briefly explained that there will be art projects in each of the NPs and that details on how groups can apply for funding is now available. Street scene. Rob Umphrey informed the meeting of two recent community clean-ups. We are looking to use Facebook and Twitter more effectively in the future to galvanise community volunteers.

Question. Has all the work with students worked? Yes, the lovewhereyoulive online campaign has already had a marked affect.

Festival. Andrew McGrath informed the meeting that next year's festival is planned for early May. The group organising it would be delighted to have anyone interested in helping organise it to let them know. It will run for a week and will include the Redland May Fair

Police update: There has been a drop in burglaries year-on-year. 15 fewer this year compared to last. Shoplifting is down 60%. This is mostly due to persistent offenders being dealt with. Big drop in ASB. There is less begging on the

Gloucester Road.

Licensed premises thought to be selling alcohol to underage drinkers have been visited and warned.

There have been some concerns for the safety of children in the past couple of weeks, with five examples of drivers approaching young girls. This appears to be a citywide issue and it is not thought the incidences are linked. The advice is that children should never get in a vehicle with a stranger. If approached, they should go to a responsible adult straight away and tell them what has happened.

Some free time-switch plugs for lights were given out. These are to prevent early evening burglaries before people are home from work.

ASB in St Andrew's Park is considerably down.

Libraries consultation

The consultation on Bristol's Library service began on 11th November and will run until 2nd February 2015. This isn't just about finding savings. It is long overdue and may lead to changes in how and where library services are delivered. The consultation is a blank page and will assume nothing. Proposals will go to cabinet on 3rd March. Group discussion on play

As part of a new approach, Tim and Daniella held a session on play in the Bishopston ward. Many of the attendees had a role and interest in play. The session began with people being asked to identify play provision on a map of the ward. There are significant health and well-being benefits to getting people together in shared spaces for fun. All generations should be able to benefit from play.

The session then went in to informal group work. The following discussion points were raised:

What's good about play in Bishopston:

- Closing streets regularly by applying to council
- Creating spaces that are safe to play
- Stay and play at school grounds

What are your play dreams/aspirations:

- Welsh model of play enablers Time, Space, Attitude
- New housing developments that incorporate space for play
- Adults being better aware of benefits
- Street scenes more conducive to play
- Adults being able to play more e.g. Park Street water slide
- Slides in classrooms as part of school design

Requests/suggestions:

- One stop shop information source for play in Bristol
- <http://www.goplacestoplay.org.uk/> or similar should be updated
- Green mapping exercise to feed in to the above
- Removal of bureaucracy
- Engaging adults more in play
- Follow Copenhagen model of play (swimming in harbour)
- Changing culture
- Talk to neighbours more
- Engaging local businesses
- Better procurement
- Better toilets
- Start with cost as no barrier

Tim and Daniella will feed back the responses and will discuss with residents how to progress the ideas that came out of the session.

Community Issues:

- Drain outside 4 Egerton Road is clogged with leaves. Suggested that it be reported online. **Afternote:** Reported online to BCC
- Anti-stick paint needs to be painted on to high poles to stop leaflets being put there
- Trip hazard from roots of trees near Meridian Terrace. Suggested it be reported on line. **Afternote:** reported online to BCC
- Can the Cider Press be asked to put a cigarette box outside? Fag ends are currently discarded on the street.
- Parkingby taxis at the top of Quarrington Road is terrible. Can it be policed?

Police do check this area regularly. Will try to check it more often

- More bike rails needed on Gloucester Road
- Tesco bins are an obstruction to pedestrians. Officers to check and discuss with shop manager
- Lidl's has applied for planning permission to build a store at the old Bristol Street Motors site
- The consultation on the proposed floodlights at Gloucestershire CCC ends in January.

Clean and Green. As of the BCC Cabinet meeting of 2nd September 2014, the annual Clean and Green allocation of £1,500 to this NP has now been 'unringfenced' and is now part of the NP's general fund. The NP is yet to decide if it wishes to retain this budget as a discrete Clean and Green budget. At the October NP meeting it agreed to consider this as part of the development of the NP Plan.


