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RECOMMENDATION

To agree the investment of the Supplementary Preventative Fund for 2009/10 and 2010/11, as set out in Appendix A of this report.

Summary

The Supplementary Preventative Fund forms part of the Children and Young People's Partnership's Prevention and Early Intervention Strategy, 2009-14.

The significant issues in the report are:

- 1. The Fund is designed to secure a range of preventative services at Level 2 of the 'triangle of need' to impact on the 'Our City' priorities, priorities of the Children and Young People's Plan and key National Indicators by improving outcomes for children and young people. This builds on the developments in recent years of both the Children's Fund and Neighbourhood Renewal.
- 2. A number of services that were funded in 2008/09 are recommended to be continued with contract extensions for one year. In addition to this funding has been allocated for investment in a portfolio of services following an open commissioning process, with contracts for 2 years and an optional one year extension.

Continuing contracts £835,500

New contracts £885,000

Made up of: £650,000 Supplementary Preventative Fund

£175,000 Positive Activities for Young People

£60,000 PCT CAMHS funding

These funding sources have been aligned to secure a more strategic approach to preventative services for children and young people.

3. The recommendations have been approved by the Prevention and Early Intervention Workstream Group as delegated by the Executive Board of the Children and Young People's Partnership.

Policy

- 1. The Prevention and Early Intervention Strategy forms a central part of the Children and Young People's Plan and impacts on 'Our City': making a difference, particularly:
 - Raising attainment at all key stages and at 19 in relation to under performing groups
 - Improving attendance and reducing exclusions
 - Reducing the number of children in care
 - Reducing offending and re-offending
 - Reducing teenage conceptions
 - Improving efficiency through commissioning

4. A participation event was held with children and young people accessing currently funded preventative services to gather their views on services, particularly in relation to the types of behaviour they wanted in workers. The results of this day were made into a DVD and were shown to the evaluation panel.

Context

- 5. The Supplementary Preventative Fund forms a key part of the implementation of the Prevention and Early Intervention Strategy. The funding is comprised of Area Based Grant (formerly Children's Fund) and reinvestment of CYPS revenue funding in prevention and early intervention.
- **6.** Investing in preventative services to improve outcomes and build resilience will impact across all the key priorities of Bristol's Children and Young People's Plan (CYPP) and Local Area Agreement (LAA):
 - 1. Improve attainment at all key stages, and at 19 (CYPP and LAA)
 - 2. Improve attendance (CYPP and LAA)
 - 3. Reduce exclusions (CYPP and LAA)
 - 4. Reduce the number of children in care, increase number of children adopted
 - 5. Reduce teenage conceptions (CYPP and LAA)
 - 6. Reduce substance misuse and increase treatment rates (CYPP and LAA)
 - 7. Increase percentage of 16-18 year olds in education, employment or training (CYPP and LAA)
 - 8. Reduce offending and re-offending (CYPP and LAA)
 - 9. Improve access to comprehensive child and adolescent mental health services (Improve Emotional Health and Well-Being)
 - 10. Improve all outcomes, as listed above, in relation to vulnerable groups e.g. children in care, BME groups and children with disabilities and learning difficulties

And a range of additional Local Area Agreement priorities.

- **7.** Investment of the Supplementary Preventative Fund for 2009/10 and 10/11 has re-contracted a number of existing services, based on a strategic risk assessment. These are included at Appendix A. In addition £94,500 has been allocated to supporting the commissioning process.
- **8.** The remaining funding has been allocated to services following an open tender process and coordinated with two other funding streams in order to secure an improved strategic approach to preventative provision. The funding allocated for 2009/10 and 2010/11 is:
 - £650,000 Supplementary Preventative Fund
 - £175,000 Positive Activities for Young People

£60,000 CAMHS funding (PCT) for 09/10*

*Initially this was £120,000 in 09/10 only, however, it has been agreed that to secure more sustainable provision this will be allocated over 2 years.

The commissioning process was open to Providers from all sectors (VCS, statutory, P&I) and has awarded contracts to:

- Targeted preventative services/interventions that focus on delivering outcomes for vulnerable children, i.e. operating at 'level 2' of the agreed triangle of need (see Appendix B).
- Services/interventions based on evidence of what works in delivering prevention and early intervention.
- Providers able to demonstrate continuous service improvement and a culture of evidence based learning as part of our Prevention and Early Intervention approach
- Quality services in line with the Children and Young People Quality Standards (partnership working, participation, child-centred working, addressing inequalities and safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children)
- Services that make a clear contribution to the priorities of the Children and Young People Plan.
- 10.As the available funding is limited the commissioning process was designed to achieve the best possible impact for children and young people by targeting the following vulnerability factors. These are based on the needs analysis of the Prevention and Early Intervention Strategy (see Appendix D for vulnerability factors). In addition the process has targeted services designed to work in particular areas of deprivation and equalities communities where these vulnerability factors are likely to be more evident.
- 11. The tender process for this investment was outcomes based in line with the outcomes framework of the Prevention and Early Intervention Strategy (see Appendix C). The tender was undertaken in two stages with an initial expression of interest and pre-tender questionnaire followed by a tender. In line with Council policy the process was undertaken using the Bristol e-Procurement System (BePS). A number of additional steps were taken to encourage participation from the voluntary and community sector. Response to the initial Expression of Interest was exceptionally high, with 73 proposals for services being shortlisted for tender, this represented around six times the available investment. This included 7 consortia bids from the VCS.
- **12.**Following the tender period a total of 64 tenders were subsequently returned. All tenders were evaluated by a panel and a shortlist agreed.

The panel included a VCS representative from the Prevention and Early Intervention Workstream Group. A number of short-listed providers were then interviewed to further inform decisions about the appropriate portfolio of services. Recommendations were approved by the Prevention and Early Intervention Workstream Group on the 11th December, as delegated by the Executive Board of the Children and Young People's Partnership.

- 13. Successful organisations were informed on 2nd January 2009 that they have preferred provider status and will be awarded a contract subject to Cabinet approval. An appeals and complaints process gave unsuccessful bidders 5 working days to lodge an appeal and these were overseen by Pauline Marson, a Programme Director Integrated Youth Offer, CYPS. 4 appeals were received by the deadline. Having been reviewed 3 were rejected; the basis of the appeal would not have materially affected the evaluation of the proposals to the extent this would have altered the outcome. A further appeal remains under review as it has raised a complex policy issue that requires further discussion.
- **14.**Contracts will now be negotiated with the aim of starting as many services as possible by 1st April 2009. (A number of recommended services have bids currently under consideration for a number of other funding sources, results of these processes may result in the need for some renegotiation of the funding levels).

Proposal

15.The services that are being recommended for funding for 2009/10 and 2010/11 by the Prevention and Early Intervention Workstream Group are listed at Appendix A. Appendix D demonstrates how the services are targeting the agreed vulnerability factors and the outcomes they will be demonstrating across the portfolio.

Other Options Considered

16. No other options were considered.

Risk Assessment

- **17.** A risk assessment has been completed for this project and a summary of the major risks is detailed below:
 - At least 6 of these services will require recruitment in order to start delivering a service to service users and due to the timescales this

may not be in place by 1st April 2009. However, identifying issues that will present risks to service start-up was assessed in the application and the JCU will work with providers to get services up and running as soon as possible.

- The majority of the investment made in preventative services has been from the Area Based Grant, this needs to continue to be highlighted in both council and national discussions in relation to the next spending round.
- 18. The main risks of not agreeing to this course of action are as follows:-

Not increasing investment in prevention and early intervention in line with the commitment of the Children and Young People's Plan and government expectations.

19. The main risks of agreeing to this course of action are as follows:-

The Supplementary Preventative Fund is largely comprised of funding from the Area Based Grant, there is therefore currently limited knowledge regarding the continuation of funding for this purpose in future spending rounds, beyond March 2011.

20. The action taken to mitigate these risks is:-

The Programme Director, Health Partnership and the JCU will ensure that;

- a) support is provided to ensure start up where possible by 1st April
- b) Business case for continuing investment is developed and used to influence future funding decisions

Equalities Impact Assessment

21.In targeting vulnerable children, young people and families in line with the needs assessment of the Supplementary Preventative Fund the investment is designed to have a positive impact on a range of vulnerable groups. The needs analysis underpinning this investment and the process for deciding on a preferred portfolio of services has continuously addressed the needs of equalities groups within it. It is therefore likely that the investment will have a positive impact on equalities communities.

An Equalities Impact Assessment has been completed and a number of actions identified. In addition, the Principal Equalities Officer acted as a member of the evaluation panel to advise on both the equalities policies and approach of individual services and any potential gaps in service provision (See Appendix E for more detail).

Environmental Impact Assessment

22. The significant impacts of this proposal are social, emotional and physical improvement for service users supported by the services commissioned through this procurement exercise. Environmental negative impacts are not expected from the commissioning of these services, however standard contractual clauses around environmental policies will be included and adherence expected from Providers.

Legal and Resource Implications

Legal

Legal Services should continue to be involved in the finalisation of the Record of Service Agreement under which this funding will be made available to the successful tenderers. This will ensure that the Council's interests are protected by having suitable and robust conditions of funding.

Financial

The councils's contribution to the Supplementary Preventative Fund is £1.284m from the Area Based Grant. The Medium Term Financial Plan 2009/10 has increased this allocation by £300k to £1.584m in line with the departmental priority to allocate additional money to early intervention & prevention.

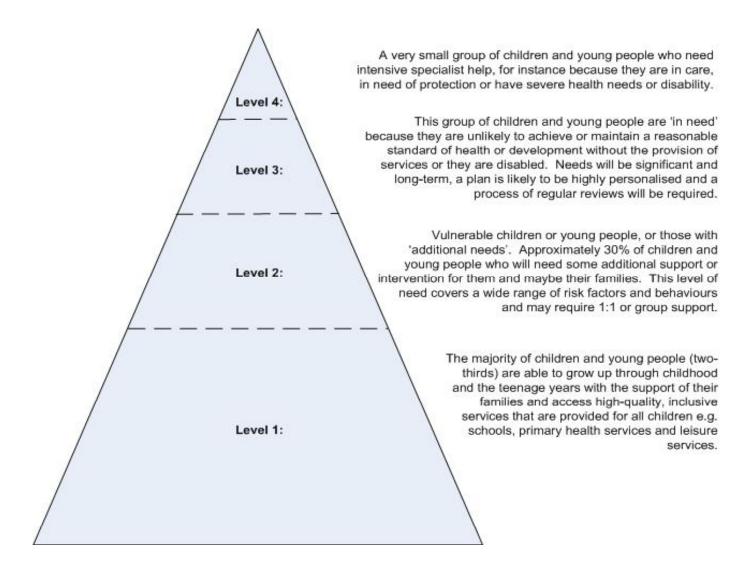

AN INTEGRATED 0-19 APPROACH TO PREVENTION & EARLY INTERVENTION

We are investing in prevention and early intervention to reduce children's risk and build their resilience in order to impact on these priorities over the medium to long term. The outcomes we want this prevention and early intervention activity to achieve for vulnerable children and young people are expressed below in terms of the protective changes likely to reduce risk and demonstrate increased resilience.

Children and young people will experience/ demonstrate:

- Healthier lifestyle choices
- Increased confidence and self-esteem
- Increased physical well-being
- Improved family cohesion through reduced stress
- Improved communication skills of children, young people and their families
- Parents, carers and families that promote healthy choices

- Safe lifestyle choices
- Reduced social isolation
- Ability to identify and benefit from a network of positive support systems in the community
- Increased selfawareness and assertiveness
- Reduced likelihood of being bullied, harassed, exploited or victims of crime
- Safe social networks
 Parents carers and
- Parents, carers and families that provide safe homes and stability

- A positive attitude to school/ learning and raised confidence in
- academic achievements
 Positive home-school relations
- Skills and ability to make and maintain a diverse range of friendships
- Are motivated to acquire new skills, knowledge and experience and broaden their horizons
- Engage in activities that form part of a positive self-identity

- Understanding of their rights, the choices available to them and have opportunities to voice their views, perceptions, wishes and opinions
- Experience positive relationships with their peers, families and positive role models within their communities
- Increased sense of self identity
- Choose not to bully or discriminate and respect other cultures/ difference
- Understand the impact of their behaviour on their own outcomes and others
- Choose not to engage in risky, anti-social or criminal behaviour

- Stable and decent housing
- Increased aspiration
- Informed choices about education, employment and training and future progression
- Families that are free from low income
- The skills and knowledge to live independently

These priorities are Local Authority or Partnership owned indicators of how well we are achieving the five outcomes for all children and young people.*

* There are other indicators that the Local Authority is required to report on to government, these are listed at appendix #.

Achievement of these outcomes for individual children can be validated in a range of ways that are both quantitative and qualitative e.g. distance-travelled measures; milestones/outputs; service user feedback. Good validation of impact will require a mixture of evidence that demonstrate outcomes.

Equalities Screening Information

Women / Men

Three services are likely to have a differential impact on young women and men due to the nature of the service provision:

- Brook 4YP Outreach part of this funding is specifically for a boys and young men worker to target boys at risk of teenage parenthood.
- CYPS Youth & Play Training positive activities around personal safety awareness and positive relationships likely to focus predominantly on young women although not exclusively.
- BASE a service for young people at risk of sexual exploitation has a
 particular focus on vulnerable young women and grooming by men
 working with the police, although also employs a boys worker to work with
 boys at risk.

BME Groups

The following services are predominantly focused on working with children, young people and families from BME groups at increased risk of vulnerability, this forms 17% of the overall investment:

Service	Targeting
East Bristol Children's Counselling	Primary school age children in EC1 (St Paul's, Easton, Lockleaze) and EC2 (Easton, Lawrence Hill, Redcliffe, Barton Hill, The Dings, St Philips Marsh) where there is a high incidence of BME and newly arrived children and young people.
Bilingual Family Mentoring Service	Children and Families with English as a additional language, initially Somali, Urdu/Panjabi, Bagla, Arabic and Polish languages. Will also impact on newly arrived families, refugees, asylum seekers.
SARI	BME children where experience of racism is a prime factor in

	vulnerability.
St Paul's Study Centre	After school study support specifically targeting BME children and young people in St Paul's, with a high attendance of Black-Caribbean, dual heritage and Somali children.
KHASS	South Asian disabled children, their families and siblings.

In addition, all services will pro-actively target vulnerable groups within which there is a recognised higher incidence in a number of BME communities. In addition, the Joint Commissioning Unit is currently undertaking a piece of research in relation to the translation and interpreting needs of services working with vulnerable children and families following a number of anecdotal comments that the expenses incurred could potentially be limiting accessibility of services.

Disabled children and young people

The following services work specifically with disabled children and young people, these services will need to be sustained during 2009/10 in light of the expected investment of additional funding to implement Aiming High for Disabled Children:

- Bristol Autism Project
- KHAAS
- Inclusive Play Project

There were limited bids within the tender for preventative working with disabled children or children with learning difficulties. As resources were not allocated to a provider for work with this group £45,000 of funding has been held back to develop provision through some other route that bridges the gap between universal and specialist services for disabled children/ children with learning difficulties. This will form an important part of the Prevention and Early Intervention Strategy and the implementation of Aiming High for Disabled Children.

In total this forms 5% of the overall investment. In addition, all potential providers were questioned at interview in regards to the inclusiveness of their proposed service and this formed part of the decision-making process. Further work will be developed with providers as a result.

LGBT

There is already specific youth provision for LGBT teenagers in place. The equalities impact assessment has identified the need to undertake further discussion with stakeholders on the monitoring of data on sexual orientation, as this is not currently undertaken for children's services.

Geographical distribution and impact on deprived neighbourhoods

The Supplementary Preventative Fund in total is distributed in the following manner geographically:

Other vulnerable groups

Clearly the funding targets vulnerability, by this nature it will impact on (but not limited to) young carers, children missing from home and care (runaways), homeless children and families, NEETs, young people at risk of teenage pregnancy, teenage parents, experiencing own or parental substance misuse, victims of crime, young people at risk of sexual exploitation and children experiencing domestic abuse.

Supporting the Voluntary and Community Sector

A number of specific steps have been taken to support the involvement of the voluntary and community sector and in particular local VCS providers. Of the 15 services recommended following the open tender part of the allocation the providers are 5 national VCS organisations (30% of value), 6 local VCS organisations (27%), 1 Academy (15%), 1 statutory provider (CYPS, 3%) and 1 private/ independent provider (2%). In addition 1 proposed service (12%) is provided by a consortia made up of 3 local VCS organisations and 1 national VCS organisation, the consortia lead is a local VCS organisation.
