**Title:** Recommendation for the future use of the Bishopsworth Pool

site

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## RECOMMENDATION

That the Neighbourhood Partnership agrees to make the following recommendation to Bristol City Council on the future use of the Bishopsworth Pool site:

- 1 That the former Bishopsworth Pool site should be developed to include: An indoor Skate Park with café, skate shop and meeting space and
  - an outdoor Village Hub with a war memorial space; parking and community events space and gardens
  - and the NP welcomes on-going negotiations with Transitions CIC to achieve this recommended development through the Community Asset Transfer Policy
- **2** Approves the proposed next steps proposed by the Steering Group, set out in Paragraph 4

#### 1. Context

**1.** The Bishopsworth Pool was closed by BCC Environment and Leisure in late January 2012 as a public swimming pool.

- a. A public meeting was held on 26<sup>th</sup> April 2012 to explore the future of the site. Colleen Bevan, the Service Manager for Environment and Leisure, made it clear that the City Council had no fixed plans for the future of the site and agreed that the local community should take the lead to identify options for future use of the site to meet local need.
- b. Following up this offer, the Bishopsworth Pool Development Steering Group was set up from this public meeting to take up the Council's offer to shape the future of the site.
- c. The Steering Group consists of local residents from Bishopsworth and Hartcliffe wards from the Dundry View NP area and Councillors Richard Eddy (Bishopsworth) and Derek Pickup (Hartcliffe); the Group is supported by Jason Bailey (BCC Corporate Property); Heather Williams (HWCP Community Manager) and Keith Houghton (Dundry View NP Area Co-ordinator)
- d. At the 25<sup>th</sup> March 2013 NP meeting the NP asked the Steering Group to deliver the following: 'Options A (village hub) and B (skateboard centre) should continue to be explored by the Steering Group at this stage with a view to a further report back to the committee in due course for final approval. In particular to consult more widely with a particular focus on engaging young people's representation'
- e. The Transitions Community Interest Company (CIC), which submitted the original Expression of Interest proposing the develop an indoor Skate Park in the former Pool building, have submitted a Business Plan to John Bos, the BCC Community Building Manager. He has recently responded back, asking them to provide some more detail to some aspects of their Plan.
- f. The Steering Group has delivered the following work in response to the March 2013 NP resolution and to inform the final recommendation in this report:
  - The Steering Group set up a week of Consultation on the recommendation to develop a combined Village Hub and Indoor Skate Park option called 'Skate Your View' running from 11<sup>th</sup> January 18<sup>th</sup> January 2014. This included running four Information Sessions on 11<sup>th</sup> January; an extensive distribution of consultation forms in community venues; an online consultation; a Winter Fayre event on 18<sup>th</sup> January at which consultation forms could be completed. Transitions CIC, the Skate Community Interest Company which made the Expression of Interest proposing the use of the Pool building as an indoor Skate Park, were present to describe their project and respond to queries and concerns on both 11<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> January events.
  - The venues that were involved were: Zion Art Centre, Bishopsworth Library, The Withyood Centre, The Gatehouse Centre and The @symes Community Building

- Heather Williams knocked on the houses surrounding the pool site and delivered 65 letters containing full details about the consultation event, questionnaire including a pre-paid envelope and a poster. The residents were given details of the Transitions Skate park and an invite to attend their site in Winterbourne, Sth Glos on January 4<sup>th</sup>
- The doorknocking enabled Heather W to answer any queries or provide details. When the decision was made to move the outdoor Winter Fayre to Headley Park Church letters advising these residents were hand delivered along with details of the website, monkey survey and a questionnaire.
- An Online survey was publicised via email and links with put on the BCC Dundry View NP page and www.dundryview.org.uk. Schools with DVNP were also sent details and asked to put the link on the website.
- Banners were placed on the Pool site gates-one advertising the workshop on January 11th and this was replaced by another one after they had finished which advertised the Winter Fayre.
- Details of the events were on the front page of Wham! 54 which is delivered to 14,500 homes in Dundry View. The Bristol Post carried two articles on December 4th 2013 and January 10th 2014. Heather Williams did a live interview on Radio Bristol on January 11th and there were replayed details of the consultation week.
- Bristol Youth Links and Learning Partnership West spoke to young peoples' community groups and young people in some of the local schools. A number of young people would like to be involved in the design, planning and any future work in respect of this project.

#### 2. Results of the 'Skate Your View' Consultation Week

a. The consultation put forward the following recommendation and response options:

The Bishopsworth Pool Development Steering Group recommends that the former Bishopsworth Pool site should be developed to include:

An indoor Skate Park with café, skate shop and meeting space

and

an outdoor Village Hub with a war memorial space; parking and community events space and gardens

Please tell us if you support this recommendation:

- a. **170** total responses came in from all the various consultation routes.
- b. The responses received were:

 95% of responses were in favour of the recommended future use of the site; 5% were opposed

See **Appendix A** for illustrated breakdown of the demographics of the responses received

c. The NP requested the Steering Group particularly to secure young people's representation. Comparing the ages of respondents directly to Dundry View 2011 Census figures is difficult as the Consultation used different and broader age bandings than the Census but the responses received do fit broadly the demographics in the Census for Dundry View NP area (over 65s were over-represented in the consultation):

The biggest absence in the consultation was from Black and Minority Ethnic residents, where none were recorded

d. Issues, concerns and ideas: the Consultation enabled people to raise issues. These were also aired at the 4 Information sessions held on 11<sup>th</sup> January and responded to directly by Transition CIC. These concerns have been clustered and Transitions's responses noted in **Appendix B** Where there is no direct or obvious response we are proposing that Transitions CIC

are asked to address the concern in their Community Asset Transfer Business Plan. A selection of the positive comments received are also included in Appendix B.

e. Numbers of resident volunteering: The Consultation enabled residents to indicate their interest in volunteering to develop the Village Hub: **13** people indicated an interest in this option. A number of other respondents indicated a strong interest in volunteering with the Skate Park itself.

## 3. Recommendation

a. The public consultation strongly supports the recommendation of the Steering Group. The Steering Group therefore requests the Dundry View Neighbourhood Partnership to agree and to forward to the Service Director Strategic Property, BCC Corporate Property, the following recommendation:

That the former Bishopsworth Pool site should be developed to include:

An indoor Skate Park with café, skate shop and meeting space

and

an outdoor Village Hub with a war memorial space; parking and community events space and gardens

and the NP welcomes on-going negotiations with Transitions CIC to achieve this recommended development through the Community Asset Transfer Policy

## 4. Outstanding Issues and Next Steps

- a. The Steering Group proposes to deliver the following pieces of work before its tasks are completed:
  - development of the Village Hub element of the Pool site and how it links to Indoor Skate Park by:
    - setting up a negotiation with BCC on future maintenance of the external areas of the Pool site and how BCC could work together with a resident-led Village Hub volunteer Group to support elements of the Village Hub
    - contributing to the drafting of the terms of the Community Asset Transfer so they achieve the best formal structure in which to deliver the community's aspirations for the Pool site and address the community concerns and aims which have emerged from the consultation week.

- bringing together local volunteers to plan out and support the setting up of a Village Hub volunteer Group to take this aspect of site forward
- finalise the interaction between the Skate Park and Village Hub responsibilities of all parties to that element of project and each other
- b. If approved by the NP, this recommendation will go to the Service Director of Strategic Property for a decision on the release of the building to make it available for Community Asset Transfer. The Community Asset Transfer process will include negotiation on the Business Plan put forward by Transitions CIC and testing of its robustness to qualify for a CAT lease and ensuring that the Community Benefits identified by Dundry View residents are written into the CAT agreement.
- c. The NP will be consulted a final time before the CAT is finally agreed and finalised with Transitions CIC. This is a standard step in the Council's CAT process.

#### 5. Risk Assessment

The following are the main potential risks identified with suggested mitigation activities:

## 6. Equality Implications

- The recommendation itself, if it is taken forward by the City Council, is likely to deliver strong positive impacts for young people in that it will add to the leisure, youth work, educational and employment/training opportunities available for them within Dundry View through the Indoor Skate Park element.
- In addition the Skate Park could deliver to adult/older members of the community through potentially providing access to the Community Café in the daytime (although this is subject to the evolution of the Skate Park within the neighbourhood, not a guaranteed benefit)
- The consultation has raised concerns about the degree to which the Skate Park element will deliver benefits to younger girls and young women; and to disabled people getting access to and direct use of the Skate facilities; These questions are being explored with Transitions CIC through the CAT process and their Business Plan.
- Another concern raised focuses on low income families/young people being able to afford to access the Skate Park: again, this is being explored with Transitions CIC through the CAT process.
- BCC Corporate Property will be expected to complete an Equality Impact Relevance Check and, potentially, an Equalities Impact Assessment to inform their decision on the CAT of the Pool to Transitions, subject to production of a satisfactory Business Plan.
- The NP Area Co-ordinator will work closely with them to ensure information from the consultation process is fed into the Equalities Assessment.

## 7. Legal

a. The final decision about the Bishopsworth Pool site lies with BCC Corporate Property, not the Dundry View Neighbourhood Partnership. The Partnership is acting in an advisory role as requested by Colleen Bevan at the 26<sup>th</sup> April 2012 Public Meeting. Legal responsibility therefore lies with BCC Corporate Property.

## 8. Financial

- a. The responsibility for the financial implications of this recommendation lies with BCC Corporate Property.
- b. The recommendation to re-use the existing building is likely to reduce the financial liability of the City Council because it removes the cost of demolishing the Pool building (@ £80,000 )and making good the site and, through the Community Asset Transfer process, transfers the ongoing running and maintenance liabilities (@£2,000 per annum) and rates liabilities to Transitions CIC, if the transfer is successfully completed.


