	Every opportunity is made to encourage people to report issues for a quicker response.
Fly tipping	An example of Fly tip and litter at the Groves, Waste Enforcement Team are looking at work which they can do to target this.
	The street cleaning crews report any fly-tipping though supervisor by phone call or they place this on their daily reports sheets. These are checked daily. The 7.5 tonne drivers keep their log of proactive work on their sheets so if we did need them we will have the evidence to show. They only report fly-tip on the Highway and pavement and would not report problem gardens or fly-tip in parks etc.

		A small working group will be set up to look at parking problems and come up with a consistent approach to be recommended to the NP
Fulford Road	LSFT	Addresses the shortage of parking bays serving the local shops on Fulford Road and improves road safety. Scheme includes a new parking layby outside the shops and the introduction of a series of speed cushions along Fulford Road to calm traffic. All design and legal work has been completed, construction is currently programmed for early 2016.
Longway Avenue / Rookery Way area		The aim of this scheme is to address issues such as obstruction and dangerous parking around junctions which make it difficult to turn safely from one road into another. This is achieved through the introduction of double yellow lines at the junctions in the area.
		Consultation completed, Traffic Regulation Order has been instructed in November 2015.
Parking issues around schools Bridge Farm and Wansdyke		PCSO work with Bridge farm and Wansdyke School saw 63 letters and 5 fixed penalty notices given out around the schools between the period Nov 14 – May 15. This was put on hold over the summer months but has started again with

		a recent 12 vehicle indexes to be checked.
		PCSO is working with the school on a parking plan and using a combination of Education and enforcement. Liaison with the central ticketing office and the police road safety officer to bolster the process.
		PCSO has applied for funding for dashcam for all PCSO vehicles which has been piloted elsewhere. There has been a significant reduction in complaints concerning parking this year.

We are also proposing improvements to the nature of the area through tree planting, cycle parking, and improved pedestrian facilities. Consultation completed, Traffic Regulation Order will be instructed in December 2015.

# Diversity Month in Dundry View Evaluation Report October 2015

## **Diversity Month synopsis**

Zion Community Space is situated in the Dundry View Neighbourhood of Bristol and which has one of the highest levels of hate crime statistics for the city and lowest levels of minority groups in the area.

We have looked at the low levels of community cohesion within our area of South Bristol and in order that we might try and combat this is a positive way we planned a month of events throughout October to try and celebrate diversity within this area and Bristol wide. The aim was to encourage as many local residents and visitors from across the city to participate in events they might not otherwise attend and improve community cohesion and lessen the tension between residents.

Diversity encompasses all areas including ethnicity, LGBT, disability and religion and we worked with many organizations including Bristol City Council, SARI, LGBT Bristol, St Pauls Carnival, BME Hartcliffe, Bristol Mind and Safer Bristol to programme inclusive events including Polish Short Film Night, LGBT Social, Theatre Monologues, Community Diversity photography exhibition, St Pauls Celebration Night, Comedy against Islamaphobia and many more.

#### The events

The calendar of events for the month was as follows:

#### Pop-Up Choir Sessions: Wednesday 23rd and 30th September

A community choir led by 'Sing with Soul' choir leader Jill Draper to encourage all the members to join together with a shared love of singing. We held two sessions, each two hours with an end goal to perform at the Diversity launch night.

Attendance over two sessions and launch night: 25 of mixed ethnic background, 20 from local community and 5 from other parts of Bristol.

## Diversity Month Launch Night: Friday 2nd October

An evening of celebration to launch the month of events, with food and wine provided by Zion Community Space and Tesco Wine Fairs, music from Iyanna Monique and the Sing with Soul Choir.

Approximately 105 people attended the launch night from the various agencies, businesses, local groups and community members.

## Kidcraft sessions: Every thursday 10-11.30pm during October (four events)

In partnership with Diversity Month, Zion ran their regular kidcraft sessions with a diversity theme covering the following topics, 'Where we live', disability and impairment, Polish folklore and Asian crafts.

Attendance was on average 15 children and their parents/carers to each session so approximately 120 over the month.

## Polish Shorts - A night of Polish short films - Wednesday 7th October

This was an evening screening of short films and animations with a link to Polish culture either through production or direction in association with CineMe.

We had 27 attendees to the event, 12 of which were Polish and a mixture from the local community and across Bristol.

#### LGBT Night - Friday 9th October

A night for members of the LGBT community and their (straight) friends to socialize and feel comfortable to be out in the local community with music from 'The Frankensteins'.

There were 48 on the night, 13 male and 33 women (including 2 transgender), the majority were LGBT+ with approx 5 straight friends.

#### Swedish Pop-up Fika Morning - Saturday 10th October

A Swedish bakery morning showcasing the local 'Fika Bristol' cakes and biscuits with a Swedish soundtrack.

We had 30 visitors in the morning including two local PCSO's, 12 of the visitors were Swedish, all were from South Bristol.

## Ikebana Flower arranging - Thursday 15th October

A workshop on the art of 'Ikebana' Japanese flower arrangements led by Lizzie Valentine. This was a regular Zion event that was themed to reflect the Diversity Month.

There were 10 attendees to the workshop from the local community.

## St Pauls Carnival Night - Saturday 17th October

Celebrating the Bristol festival, this was a night of music from steel pan musician Bubbles, West Indian food from Top Taste, a talk from festival director Cleo Lake and a short film 'Celebrate What?' showing footage from the original festival.

There were 20 attendees for the evening.

# 'Not on our doorstep' a workshop with SARI and BHCS - Wednesday 21st October

A workshop and talk from Bristol Hate Crime Services partners on the issues that exist in Dundry View around hate crime and what is being done to combat these problems.

There were 22 attendees from various agencies in Bristol.

# 'A Breath' Theatre monologues - Thursday 22nd October

A commissioned new theatre piece written by Dr Edson Burton and directed by Nancy Medina, three interlinking monologues challenging perceptions of who are the perpetrators and who are the victims of hate crimes.

There were 27 audience members for the theatre night, a mix from the local community and across the city. The age range was from teenagers through to senior citizens.

## Stand-up with Shazia Mirza - Friday 23rd October

A night of comedy with Shazia Mirza and guest appearances from Angie Belcher and Stefan Alun. Shazia Mirza is known for using comedy and sharp wit to combat Islamaphobia.

We had 73 audience members from across the city and the local community from a mixed white and BME background.

#### South Bristol BME coffee morning

A chance for local families to meet up for a chat and meet any new residents. We had 9 people from the BMG group including a new family to the area.

#### Diversity in our Community Exhibition

A look at the journeys residents have taken and their family histories from across the globe and more locally.

This exhibition was in place throughout October, it showed the stories behind 16 families and individuals that live in the local area.

We have 1-1.5 thousand visitors during a month at Zion and all would have had the opportunity to view the exhibition.

## Promotion and Marketing


The month of events was promoted through x5000 printed programmes that were delivered to local houses and venues in South Bristol including a permanent stand in Sainsburys (Winterstoke Rd) and Co-Op (Bishopsworth Rd). We also created a unique facebook page for the events and listed them on the Zion website. The month was promoted through Zion facebook page (1700 followers) and the twitter feed (2500 followers).

#### SARI Bristol

This month has enabled the members of the BME Friendship Group to take part in a variety of activities. Some of the group were part of the photographic exhibition and were really pleased to see them displayed. The members took part in many of the activities including the diversity choir, the opening night and the community chat café. It was such a great way of supporting hard to reach groups in the community in a way that was fun and natural for the whole family. The Dundry View Hate Crime and Community Cohesion Research (2013) report recommended that we should 'increase the capacity of the voluntary and community sector organisations working in the area to be able to provide more support to affected families and to undertake more work around community cohesion' This first Diversity Month has led the way to provide opportunities for all residents in the Dundry View NP area.

The costs of the event totalled £5326 not including the time/hire of the space and programme organization and planning.

We had hoped to receive £1650 through the Dundry View Wellbeing Fund but the application was rejected as 'not being a priority'. The remainder costs were raised through a raffle on the launch night and from Zion Community Space.



## Summary and conclusions from the month...

We had anticipated a slow take-up for the Diversity Month and were looking to build on the event as a yearly programme, however the event proved much more successful than we could have anticipated, considering the low budget and short time scale we were working on, which shows the need for the Diversity programme and the willingness of the community to be involved.

The positive results of Diversity Month will carry on in the area into the future, friendships have been formed, the BME community now know they can feel safe and welcome in a key community space in the area and many residents feel happier discussing issues that have arisen and how they might help to combat future problems or prejudices.

One of the hopes we had for the programme was to improve communication, to enable people to ask questions without feeling embarrassed or ignorant, we believe all of the events have helped to achieve this and from working with all the partners of the Bristol Hate Crime Services we have established links that can only continue to improve the community and challenge some perceptions that are outdated and unwelcome to the majority of residents.

This is one of the best achievements that Zion Community Space has produced in the four years of operating and we hope to continue to build on this fantastic programme of events as a yearly event.
