<u>After-school park sessions</u> Wednesday - Kings Head Lane Park Thursday - Millennium Green		<p>In partnership with Friends of Hartcliffe Millennium Green we successfully applied for 'pocket park' funding from the Department for Communities and Local Government. We have put in a pre-planning application to use the space on the site of Teyfant Primary School and create a space with the local community that is well-used by children, young people and families.</p> <p>We have worked with the parks department at Kings Head Lane park to use the changing rooms in the park through the winter so that we can continue to deliver activities, even when the weather is poor.</p> <p>We have had 88 different children access our park session at Kings Head Lane and 216 access our Millennium Green session since they began.</p> <p>In partnership with HHEAG and local primary schools (Fair Furlong, St Pius and Hareclive) we will be starting a Forest School project at the new Roundhouse facility at the Bouchier Gardens Allotments.</p>

Rubbish, littering and fly-tip	0	The waste team have provided data of work they have been doing within Dundry View over the last 12 months, see table below.

	<p>In December 21x business in Whitchurch Park ward were visited to check they had commercial waste contracts in place. 1x business was unable to evidence how they disposed of their waste and 2x were closed. The 3x businesses will be served with notices require production of waste transfer notes, where failure to produce is an offence and offenders liable for a £300 Fixed-Penalty-Notice.</p> <p>On 26th January the Streetscene Enforcement Team carried out visits to all shops in the Hartcliffe ward. Additional to checking for commercial waste contracts any business with a bin stored on the pavement will be served with a notice tightening restrictions on how it is to be maintained, or requiring off-street storage if possible. Operation Secure is a rolling city wide operation that will eventually cover the whole city targeting commercial bin/waste as a potential source of litter and fly-tipping.</p>

Hartcliffe Detached Session LPW Tuesday evenings		<p>In response to issues of ASB around Wilmott Park and Mowcroft Rd we delivered a 6 week project. Workers organised activities on the football courts on Moxham Drive and went walking around the local neighbourhood speaking to young people about the activities we have on offer and collecting their ideas for new projects they would be interested.</p> <p>As a result, we are starting a football project with 10 young people from the Mowcroft Rd area. We are also planning a motorbike project (teaching maintenance skills alongside safe driving, CBT, licence with the 16-19 age group.</p> <p>We also conducted some outreach work outside Headley Park church, responding to issues raised by the church and the local scouts group.</p>
1.8 Priority 2: Crime and Fear of Crime (Domestic abuse, Drugs, Hate Crime)		

		<p>The Equality Champions are still meeting, though as many of the original group are now in year 11 and need to focus on exams there was a need to reduce commitment so they are currently meeting fortnightly. The young people are most interested in peer mentoring future champions at present.</p> <p>This will most likely involve starting the program again with new young people, possibly at a new school, with the original group supporting the project and sharing their learning with the new young people.</p>

		<p>LPW conducted some outreach work outside Headley Park church, responding to issues raised by the church and the local scouts group. We have put them in touch with training opportunities to develop their own staff to work with more difficult young people and are looking at opportunities to develop a project together in the future.</p>

9. Plan Review

- **Background**

Over the past year the NP has been progressing the delivery of our NP Action Plan.

Following an internal analysis of the plan and the scope of delivery it is appropriate to undertake a review of the Plan priorities around what project and activities can be delivered in Year 2 (2016/17) with the resources available.

- **Working Group**

A small working group has come together to identify what projects and activities are progressed to meet the delivery of the NP Action Plan for year 2. It is made up of resident representatives, local Councillor and the Neighbourhood Partnership Coordinator.

This group will make recommendations to the Neighbourhood Committee to prioritise the issues with regards to the allocation of any resources to the projects and activities identified through a consultative approach. The full three year plan will still exist but we want to focus our time and resource on projects and activities which can be achieved in 2016/17.

- **Action Plan**

The recommendations will be shared prior to the next Neighbourhood Partnership meeting in June for adoption or amendment at that time.

10. Citywide Priorities

- Across all 14 Neighbourhood Partnership there are some key priorities that have shared asks and needs, currently the Neighbourhood Management Service are looking to see if these shared priorities could be tackled at a more strategic level. The NPC will bring back a report to the next NP meeting.
