

## Operation Biker. See Appendix F

Please see the attached Operation Biker Report from Inspector Colin Salmon. This report is going to all Brislington Beat Neighbourhood Partnership areas.

#### 5. Note Neighbourhood Policing Inspector Colin Salmon's Retirement.

After thirteen years as the Brislington Neighbourhood Inspector, the longest serving officer in such a role in the Avon and Somerset Constabulary, Inspector Colin Salmon will be retiring at the end of February.

Inspector Salmon said: "It is with great sadness that I have decided to retire after nearly thirty-three years in the service. It has been an honour serving as the local Inspector in the area that I grew up in and I will miss my colleagues, partners and the many local residents I have come to know over the years. Although there is often differing views over the accuracy of crime figures, I have seen how much things have changed during my time here.

The reported crime levels in our area for last year show there were over eight thousand less crimes reported in 2012 compared to ten years ago, which represents a reduction in excess of sixty percent.

The reduction in serious criminal offences, such as burglary, is even greater. To the members of the Neighbourhood Team this means significantly less victims in the communities that they serve and reflects their ongoing commitment to reduce the number of victims even further".

The process to appoint a successor has begun we will let our communities know who has been appointed in due course.

## 6. Note South Bristol Youth Service Provider Update. See Appendix G

The transfer of services and staff to the new Bristol Youth Links providers took place on 1 February 2013 as planned.

Bristol Youth Links aims to create more up-to-date, joined up provision for children and young people aged eight to 19, outside school. The programme of delivery includes youth groups, play services, advice and guidance, and support to help young people volunteer and get involved in their communities.

Youth services in North, North Central, Inner, South East and South West Bristol are now being delivered by a consortium made up of Learning Partnership West, 1625 Independent People, Barnardo's, and TBG Learning (part of Rehab Jobfit).

All City Council run youth centres and adventure playgrounds remain open, with the new services being delivered from them.

Over the coming months CYPS will be working with the new providers in some places, and local community organisations in others on the transfer of

centres and playgrounds. Capital funding secured last year will be allocated on a case-by-case basis to make adaptations to facilities to help ensure their future viability.

From Easter Learning Partnership West will begin to implement their targeted services in full.

CYPS senior practitioners will work with local volunteers and neighbourhood partnerships to develop new youth provision and street and open spaces play where there is an interest and where this adds value to the targeted services funded by the council.

## 7. Note Celebrating Age Festival.

This summers Celebrating Age Festival is looking for resident's aged 55 or over to take part and offering grants of up to £200 to stage an event.

The Festival, which runs from 24 June to 7 July, will be themed 'Brilliant in Bristol: Many Communities, Many Cultures, One City', to reflect the talent and the diversity of Bristol's older people.

Events will be taking place in all communities during the two weeks as well as a main Celebration event at City Hall on 29 June.

The Celebrating Age committee is looking for people and groups with a range of talents to get involved - from singing, dancing or writing to craft making, gardening or baking. The intention is to have at least one event in every Neighbourhood Partnership area as part of the festival, and these events will be publicised in an event brochure across the city.

The festival is also looking for people who would like to promote their activity or sell their products at the Celebration event on 29 June to apply for a free stall.

#### 8. Note Big Green Week.

Neighbourhood Partnerships are invited to get involved with Bristol's BIG Green Week 2013.

Big Green Week runs 15-23 June and is the UK's annual festival of environmental ideas, art and culture, hosting more than 100 events in 9 days last June, half of which were Fringe Festival events, attracting a total audience of over 40,000.

At stake is a new £500 Award for the 'Best Fringe Event' that attracts the largest audience, offered by the Bristol Green Capital Partnership.

Community Fringe events last year included informational talks, workshops and exhibitions and this year we hope to offer an even more diverse programme. We had particular feedback from visitors last year asking for more practical thinking workshops, from growing your own food and cooking, to making your own solar panels.

## 9. Note Mayor Visit to Filwood, Knowle and Windmill Hill.

The Filwood, Knowle and Windmill Hill Neighbourhood Partnership have invited the Mayor to visit the area in the next few months. Ideas for the visit include:

- Visit to Christ the King Primary School to participate in the Raising Aspirations Project - this will involve the Mayor taking questions on his role from primary school children.
- Filwood an escorted visit to the Filwood Park and Filwood Broadway development sites and other sites showing the need for the Knowle West Regeneration Framework such as Inns Court.
- Visit to the Knowle West Children's Centre, including a short tour and meeting parents.
- Knowle an escorted visit to Salcombe Rd, Queenshill, Axbridge Rd, Broadwalk and the recent improvements to Redcatch Park.
- Windmill Hill an escorted visit covering Kingswear and Torpoint, and Marksbury Road College development sites, the lodge in Victoria Park and Zone A.

Partnership members will be invited to participate in the visit when a date is agreed.

# 10. Note Filwood, Knowle and Windmill Hill Neighbourhood Partnership Census Profile. See Appendix E

The Census Profile for the Filwood, Knowle and Windmill Hill Neighbourhood Partnership gives an indication of some of the demographic information that is emerging from the 2011 Census.

More information will become available in the year allowing the partnership to see how wards have changed over time, explore trends, and give the partnership good information enabling it to plan for the future.

#### 11. Note Bristol Switch and Save scheme launching 21 February 2013

Bristol Switch and Save is a collective buying scheme aiming to move at least 5000 residents and businesses on domestic tariffs to better energy deals, helping them save money on their gas and electricity bills. Through collective bargaining with energy companies we are likely to get a better tariff than through existing switching sites, taking the hassle out of finding a better deal.

We are particularly keen to reach households who haven't switched energy supplier for some time or at all, don't commonly use comparison websites and/or are confused about their options for buying energy. Any household could benefit – and the more people who join in, the greater our buying power on behalf of everyone. In similar schemes UK householders have saved up to £400 on their annual energy bills. Typical savings range from £125-£200 depending on circumstances and payment method.

How the scheme works: 1) register your interest through the website or use the freephone number provided, 2) Bristol Switch & Save will negotiate a tariff for the scheme for both fuel types and all payment types, 3) Bristol Switch & Save will contact you in April with the new tariff, 4) If this is better than what you are currently paying, you can agree to switch providers.

## 12. Community Transport Consultation

The council is to consult on changing the way it funds community transport in the Bristol. New proposals are based on residents' surveys and discussions with existing providers of community transport services.

The survey, of both existing users and all interested residents, was taken during Spring and early Summer 2012. It shows the reach and limitations of existing services, and identifies demand across the whole city.

Now the council is to consult on new proposals based on this research. The aim is to get people's views on the proposals which will inform a final option to be presented to the Mayor for decision in the Summer of 2013.

The consultation is running for 12 weeks until 15th May 2013

#### Notes

- [1] A usual resident of the UK is anyone who, on census day, was in the UK and had stayed or intended to stay in the UK for a period of 12 months or more, or had a permanent UK address and was outside the UK and intended to be outside the UK for less than 12 months.
- [2] A communal establishment is an establishment providing managed residential accommodation. 'Managed' in this context means full-time or part-time supervision of the accommodation.
- [3] Schoolchildren and students in full-time education studying away from their family home are treated as usually resident at their term-time address. Students are shown as a percentage of the total population living in the area.
- [4] A long-term health problem or disability that limits a person's day-to-day activities, and has lasted, or is expected to last, at least 12 months. This includes problems that are related to old age.
- [5] A person is a provider of unpaid care if they look after or give help or support to family members, friends, neighbours or others because of long-term physical or mental ill health or disability, or problems related to old age.
- [6] A person aged 16 to 74 is described as economically active if, in the week before the census, they were: (i) in employment, as an employee or self-employed; (ii) not in employment, but were seeking work and ready to start work within two weeks, or (iii) not in employment, but waiting to start a job already obtained and available.
- [7] A person aged 16 to 74 is described as economically inactive if, in the week before the census, they were not in employment but did not meet the criteria to be classified as 'Unemployed'. This includes a person looking for work but not available to start work within two weeks, as well as anyone not looking for work, or unable to work.
- [8] Level 1 qualifications: 1-4 O Levels/CSE/GCSEs (any grades), NVQ level 1, Foundation GNVQ.

- [9] A dwelling is a unit of accommodation in which all rooms including the kitchen, bathroom and toilet are behind a door that only that household can use. A dwelling may comprise one or more household spaces (the accommodation used or available for use by an individual household).
- [10] A household is defined as one person living alone, or a group of people (not necessarily related) living at the same address who share cooking facilities and share a living room or sitting room or dining area.
- [11] The Census asked respondents to identify who their landlord is and the results reflect the responses they gave. In the past decade many local authorities have transferred the management of their housing stock to other social landlords. Individuals responding to the Census will report their understanding of their landlord and this may not reflect the actual management arrangements in all cases.
- [12] Occupancy rating provides a measure of whether a household's accommodation is overcrowded or under occupied. There are two measures of occupancy rating, one based on the number of rooms in a household's accommodation, and one based on the number of bedrooms. The ages of the household members and their relationships to each other are used to derive the number of rooms/bedrooms they require. #### Draft - Update on Neighbourhood Partnership briefing paper September 2012 Operation Biker South Bristol

The plan outlined in the original NP briefing document (July 2012) was that from September 2013, two of the five Neighbourhood Partnerships would provide dedicated funding of £500 per ward, so that additional dedicated police patrols on motorcycles could be conducted on their areas, specifically to address Anti-Social use of motorcycles in public areas. This would be in addition to general police patrols on these motorcycles, which although not a core police function would continue. Because of changes in how calls of Anti-Social Behaviour are recorded by the police, they are no longer able to give specific data relating to the levels of calls from the community around this specific type of behaviour.

#### **Outcome**

A number of the dedicated Operation Biker patrols were organised on the funded wards. However each time they took place the officers involved were deployed to instances of Anti-Social behaviour on non-funded wards – In particular Stockwood, Hengrove, Withywood and Hartcliffe. Therefore the costs of these dedicated patrols had to be met by the police rather than from the funding wards in accordance with the funding agreement. As a result each dedicated patrol activity had to be stopped due to these financial restraints.

After several attempts it was clear that the original plan would not work, and all monies were returned to the originating two partnerships.

As a result of this there has been no external contribution made to Operation Biker in 2012/2013.

In 2012 (even though this was the wettest summer since the Operation began) there was a total of 348 officer hours deployed to the Operation. Compared to yearly average over preceding three years of 533 hours. In 2012 278 hours was made up of duty time participation compared to an average 292 hours over previous years.

Because of the above police had to cover the costs of the dedicated patrols in 2012 for 70 hours, external funding had previously provided on average 241 hours over previous three years.

17 Vehicles were seized in 2012 compared to an average of 29 a year in previous three years. The number seizures that have occurred during the dedicated patrol activity organised to deal with specific problems as they arise remained unchanged at 60%.

As feared the loss of external funding contributions has meant that some of the specially trained officers have not been able to participate in the operation and As a result of this the number of officers available for deployment has fallen from 16 at the beginning of 2012 to just 8 at the beginning of 2013.

#### The Future

1. With no external funding - no dedicated Operation Biker patrols will be organised for 2013/2014. All patrol will have to be undertaken as part of general policing deployments.

- 2. No additional police officers will be trained or equipped to participate in the operation as the pool of officers eligible (possessing motorcycle licence) or viable, due to operational duty roles, prohibit this. However it is hoped that up to four of the officers who were previously available will be able to reengage with the operation from the spring 2013.
- 3. Experience has shown that any request from a single Neighbourhood Partnership to contribute to dedicated patrols of their wards is not possible and future requests will reluctantly not be possible unless agreement is given that resources can be deployed across all 12 wards of South Bristol from such funding offers.
- 4. The two motorcycles available for police use are now entering their 9<sup>th</sup> year of operation and may need replacing at the end of 2013, Due to their reduced use and limited area of operations; they may be at risk during future police fleet reviews.
- 5. Sergeant Johnson form Brislington Neighbourhood area will be taking on the lead for Operation Biker from Inspector Salmon following his retirement.
- 6. Ongoing concerns from the community or issues from Forums around this type of behaviour will have to be addressed by the police from normal duty deployments, with consideration to ongoing operational commitments to core police activity.
- 7. The Anti-Social use of motorcycles continues to be raised as community concerns, having been raised as new priorities at two Forums on two separate NP areas already in 2013.
