1. Neighbourhood Budget

- Full council meeting on Tuesday 17th Feb 2015 approved the 2015/16 City Council Budget. This means from 1st April 2015, the Filwood Knowle and Windmill Hill Partnership will receive a total devolved Neighbourhood Budget of £85,190.72 for 2015/16. This is in addition to CIL and Section 106 funds.
- The table below shows proposals to manage the 2015/16 Neighbourhood Budget, which is based on previous years expenditure pattern and the Filwood Knowle and Windmill Neighbourhood Partnership Plan. The NC is asked to approve this proposal.

3. Neighbourhood Partnership Plan (Amended)

A NP task group met on 21 April and 19 May to look at the NP Pan and to discuss possible changes to the Partnership's communication methods. As a result of the two task group meetings, changes to the NP Plan have been suggested, these can be viewed in appendix 5

5. Tree Champion update report (Jim Smith Filwood Tree Champion)

I have assisted in planting an `Apple Orchard` in the grounds of The Knowle West Children`s Centre, Leinster Avenue, assisted by children/teachers/members of staff (2014/15). The Centre will maintain the trees following my advice. In the `wild area` on this site, I also planted pears/cherry's/plums/a Quince tree and a Medlar tree. The children will be able to harvest and consume the fruits.

In season 2015/16 `Youth Moves` (Ben Carpenter) will be planting `Nut Trees` - Hazel/Sweet Chestnut/Walnuts. In the `copse` next to the `Roundhouse`, I will assist in my role as Tree Champion.

This coming 2015/16 season I have also arranged for Helen Humphries (PIP's) to deliver fruit trees to Springfield Allotments, to be planted, under the supervision of Steve and myself assisting.

I have met with local tree officer, Matt Bennett, to open discussions with him regarding Tree Issues in the Filwood ward.

6. S106 decision (St Luke's Road Tree replacement scheme)

At the Neighbourhood Partnership meeting on 13 January 2015 the NP discussed and agreed expenditure for the replacement of trees on St Lukes Road. Since the meeting, the work has been carried out, however, in order to pay for the completed work it is recommended that this decision is noted formally recorded to release the appropriate funds from the Bushy Park development. Please see appendix 7 for details of the scheme.

7. Redcatch Park equipment

The NP is asked to approve £3,675.44 of Section 106 funding (from the St Peters Hospice development) to purchase and install outdoor gym equipment and park bench/tables in Redcatch Park.

Our vision - The Neighbourhood Partnership will be places where residents are engaged and involved in decisions that affect them, are living a better quality of life in a pleasant environment, and have improved educational and employment opportunities for all residents.

Money

1. The Neighbourhood Budget

Highways – £51,428

Wellbeing fund – £30,000 for a twelve month period

Clean and Green fund - £1,500

Section 106 – this is money that developers of larger sites pay to the council to reduce the impact of the development. Developers sign a S106 agreement as part of their planning permission. This is a legal document that specifies what the money is spent on and where. For example, S106 money is used to make improvements to highways, parks, public transport and schools. Section 106 funds are variable and dependant on the level and scale of local developments.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) – this allows local planning authorities to raise funds from developers who are undertaking new building projects in their area. The funds raised will go towards infrastructure that is needed to support the growth of the city, such as schools and transport improvements. CIL funds are variable and dependant on the level and scale of local developments.

How does the Partnership operate and makes decisions?

The Neighbourhood Partnership has four Neighbourhood Partnership meetings per year. All the meetings are open to any member of the public to attend and take part in the discussions at the meetings. All Neighbourhood Budget decisions are made by the six ward councillors. All City Wide Bristol City Council resources decisions are taken by all members of the Neighbourhood Partnership.

There are four Neighbourhood Forums in each ward annually. These are open meetings where information is shared, concerns gathered and updates on previous Forum issues updated. Residents from the area are encouraged to attend through publicity in the local community magazine The Knowledge, by email and through leaflets and posters.

The Neighbourhood Partnership has two Filwood based meetings:

Knowle West Together – A monthly meeting of residents, voluntary and statutory sector agencies

Knowle West Liveability – A monthly meeting of residents, voluntary and statutory sector agencies focusing on environmental issues

Each Ward has a grants panel to assess and make recommendations on the allocation of the Wellbeing Fund and the Neighbourhood Partnership Green Capital Fund.

Neighbourhood Partnerships are local decision-making structures that consult on and agree community priorities and deliver positive impacts in their areas. The agreed priorities are set out in each area's Neighbourhood Partnership Plan.

There are 14 Neighbourhood Partnerships in Bristol made up of either two or three electoral wards. The membership of each partnership includes residents, organisations and the local Councillors from the wards within the Partnership area.

Each Partnership allocates significant resources to benefit their local community. Improvements they have made include new playgrounds, sports facilities, provision for older and younger residents, as well as making grants to support many local voluntary groups.

Most Partnerships hold regular open meetings called Neighbourhood Forums, where anyone from the neighbourhood can come and raise ideas and concerns about local services and community issues.

Subgroups focus on key topics like Parks and Transport. They develop ideas and their recommendations for action are then put forward to the Partnership.

Tree replacement on St Lukes Road and St Lukes Steps

- 4 trees have been felled recently on St Lukes Road and St Lukes Steps
- The species were 1 of Sorbus intermedia (Swedish whitebeam), 1 of Sorbus aria (native Whitebeam) and 2 of Sorbus aucuparia (rowan / mountain ash)
- The council no longer has revenue budget to replace felled street trees
- TreeBristol requires funding to plant trees, for example from Neighbourhood Partnerships,
 Section 106 and private sponsorship
- The funding required to replace the 4 trees is £1,100.00 (at £275.00 per tree); this includes:
 - Grinding out of the old stumps
 - Supply of 4 new trees, approx. 3-4 metres tall (same species as above)
 - Contractor planting of 4 trees fitted with double stakes and steel guards and a woodchip mulch
 - Watering of 4 trees for the first 2 years to ensure they establish
