#### 1. Neighbourhood Forum update:

The last Forum meeting was held on March 11<sup>th</sup> 2013 – an update on Forums and Community Engagement work will be provided at the June 2013 NP meeting.

#### 2. South Bristol Youth Service Provider Update. (Appendix A)

The transfer of services and staff to the new Bristol Youth Links providers took place on 1 February 2013 as planned. Bristol Youth Links aims to create more up-to-date, joined up provision for children and young people aged eight to 19, outside school. The programme of delivery includes youth groups, play services, advice and guidance, and support to help young people volunteer and get involved in their communities.

Youth services in North, North Central, Inner, South East and South West Bristol are now being delivered by a consortium made up of Learning Partnership West, 1625 Independent People, Barnardo's, and TBG Learning (part of Rehab Jobfit).

All City Council run youth centres and adventure playgrounds remain open, with the new services being delivered from them. Over the coming months

CYPS will be working with the new providers in some places, and local community organisations in others on the transfer of centres and playgrounds. Capital funding secured last year will be allocated on a case-by-case basis to make adaptations to facilities to help ensure their future viability.

From Easter Learning Partnership West will begin to implement their targeted services in full.

CYPS senior practitioners will work with local volunteers and neighbourhood partnerships to develop new youth provision and street and open spaces play where there is an interest and where this adds value to the targeted services funded by the council.

### **3. Celebrating Age Festival**

This summers Celebrating Age Festival is looking for resident's aged 55 or over to take part and offering grants of up to £200 to stage an event. The Festival, which runs from 24 June to 7 July, will be themed 'Brilliant in Bristol: Many Communities, Many Cultures, One City', to reflect the talent and the diversity of Bristol's older people.

Events will be taking place in all communities during the two weeks as well as a main Celebration event at City Hall on 29 June.

The Celebrating Age committee is looking for people and groups with a range of talents to get involved - from singing, dancing or writing to craft making, gardening or baking. The intention is to have at least one event in every Neighbourhood Partnership area as part of the festival, and these events will be publicised in an event brochure across the city.

The festival is also looking for people who would like to promote their activity or sell their products at the Celebration event on 29 June to apply for a free stall.

#### **4. Big Green Week**

Neighbourhood Partnerships are invited to get involved with Bristol's BIG Green Week 2013.

Big Green Week runs 15-23 June and is the UK's annual festival of environmental ideas, art and culture, hosting more than 100 events in 9 days last June, half of which were Fringe Festival events, attracting a total audience of over 40,000.

At stake is a new £500 Award for the 'Best Fringe Event' that attracts the largest audience, offered by the Bristol Green Capital Partnership. Community Fringe events last year included informational talks, workshops and exhibitions and this year we hope to offer an even more diverse programme.

We had particular feedback from visitors last year asking for more practical thinking workshops, from growing your own food and cooking, to making your own solar panels.

#### **5. Mayor Visit to Greater Brislington**

#### **6. Greater Brislington Neighbourhood Partnership Census Profile. (Appendix B)**

The Census Profile for Greater Brislington Neighbourhood

Partnership gives an indication of some of the demographic information that is emerging from the 2011 Census.

More information will become available in the year allowing the partnership to see how wards have changed over time, explore trends, and give the partnership good information enabling it to plan for the future.

## **7. Bristol Switch and Save Scheme**

Bristol Switch and Save is a collective buying scheme aiming to move at least 5000 residents and businesses on domestic tariffs to better energy deals, helping them save money on their gas and electricity bills.

Through collective bargaining with energy companies we are likely to get a better tariff than through existing switching sites, taking the hassle out of finding a better deal.

We are particularly keen to reach households who haven't switched energy supplier for some time or at all, don't commonly use comparison websites and/or are confused about their options for buying energy. Any household could benefit – and the more people who join in, the greater our buying power on behalf of everyone. In similar schemes UK householders have saved up to £400 on their annual energy bills. Typical savings range from £125-£200 depending on circumstances and payment method.

How the scheme works:

- 1) Register your interest through the website or use the freephone number provided,
- 2) Bristol Switch & Save will negotiate a tariff for the scheme for both fuel types and all payment types,
- 3) Bristol Switch & Save will contact you in April with the new tariff, 4) If this is better than what you are currently paying, you can agree to switch providers.

## **8. Community Transport Consultation**

The council is to consult on changing the way it funds community transport in the Bristol. New proposals are based on residents' surveys and discussions with existing providers of community transport services.

The survey, of both existing users and all interested residents, was taken during Spring and early Summer 2012. It shows the reach and limitations of existing services, and identifies demand across the whole city.

Now the council is to consult on new proposals based on this research. The aim is to get people's views on the proposals which will inform a final option to be presented to the Mayor for decision in the Summer of 2013.

The consultation is running for 12 weeks until 15th May 2013

### Notes

- [1] A usual resident of the UK is anyone who, on census day, was in the UK and had stayed or intended to stay in the UK for a period of 12 months or more, or had a permanent UK address and was outside the UK and intended to be outside the UK for less than 12 months.
- [2] A communal establishment is an establishment providing managed residential accommodation. 'Managed' in this context means full-time or part-time supervision of the accommodation.
- [3] Schoolchildren and students in full-time education studying away from their family home are treated as usually resident at their term-time address. Students are shown as a percentage of the total population living in the area.
- [4] A long-term health problem or disability that limits a person's day-to-day activities, and has lasted, or is expected to last, at least 12 months. This includes problems that are related to old age.
- [5] A person is a provider of unpaid care if they look after or give help or support to family members, friends, neighbours or others because of long-term physical or mental ill health or disability, or problems related to old age.
- [6] A person aged 16 to 74 is described as economically active if, in the week before the census, they were: (i) in employment, as an employee or self-employed; (ii) not in employment, but were seeking work and ready to start work within two weeks, or (iii) not in employment, but waiting to start a job already obtained and available.
- [7] A person aged 16 to 74 is described as economically inactive if, in the week before the census, they were not in employment but did not meet the criteria to be classified as 'Unemployed'. This includes a person looking for work but not available to start work within two weeks, as well as anyone not looking for work, or unable to work.
- [8] Level 1 qualifications: 1-4 O Levels/CSE/GCSEs (any grades), NVQ level 1, Foundation GNVQ.  
Level 2 qualifications: 5+ O Level (Passes)/CSEs (Grade 1)/GCSEs (Grades A\*-C), School Certificate, 1 A Level/ 2-3 AS Levels/VCEs, NVQ level 2, Intermediate GNVQ, City and Guilds Craft, BTEC First/General Diploma, RSA Diploma Apprenticeship.  
Level 3 qualifications: 2+ A Levels/VCEs, 4+ AS Levels, Higher School Certificate, Progression/Advanced Diploma, NVQ Level 3, Advanced GNVQ, City and Guilds Advanced Craft, ONC, OND, BTEC National, RSA Advanced Diploma.  
Level 4+ qualifications: Degree, Higher Degree, NVQ Level 4-5, HNC, HND, RSA Higher Diploma, BTEC Higher level, Foundation degree (NI), Professional qualifications (for example teaching, nursing, accountancy).  
Other qualifications: Vocational/Work-related Qualifications, Foreign Qualifications (Not stated/ level unknown).
- [9] A dwelling is a unit of accommodation in which all rooms - including the kitchen, bathroom and toilet - are behind a door that only that household can use. A dwelling may comprise one or more household spaces (the accommodation used or available for use by an individual household).
- [10] A household is defined as one person living alone, or a group of people (not necessarily related) living at the same address who share cooking facilities and share a living room or sitting room or dining area.
- [11] The Census asked respondents to identify who their landlord is and the results reflect the responses they gave. In the past decade many local authorities have transferred the management of their housing stock to other social landlords. Individuals responding to the Census will report their understanding of their landlord and this may not reflect the actual management arrangements in all cases.
- [12] Occupancy rating provides a measure of whether a household's accommodation is overcrowded or under occupied. There are two measures of occupancy rating, one based on the number of rooms in a household's accommodation, and one based on the number of bedrooms. The ages of the household members and their relationships to each other are used to derive the number of rooms/bedrooms they require. An occupancy rating of -1 implies that a household has one fewer room/bedroom than required, whereas +1 implies that they have one more room/bedroom than required.
- [13] A dependent child is a person aged 0 - 15 in a household or aged 16 -18 in full-time education and living in a family with his or her parent(s).
