# Part 1: Briefing on Expansion of Discretionary Licensing for Neighbourhood Partnership meeting:

- 1- Bristol City Council already does many things to help deal with poor conditions in the private rented sector. It is already within our powers to respond to complaints about property conditions and take enforcement action where applicable. For large Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMO) mandatory licensing ensures that landlords /agents managing 3 storey properties occupied by 5 or more people must apply for a licence and comply with licensing conditions relating to both property condition and management. A fee is charged by the local authority to cover administration costs for this.
- 2- However, the majority of smaller privately rented properties do not fall into this category and many are in poor condition. This rental sector is growing rapidly and many of the new landlords are not aware of, or deliberately ignore the minimum housing standards that their properties should meet under the Housing Act 2004. Their tenants are often also unaware of their rights to living in decent housing conditions and often believe they cannot do anything about it or are too afraid to report these problems for fear of repercussions from the landlord. Discretionary Licensing would give us additional powers to tackle these problems proactively on an area based approach. This will allow us to, inspect all privately rented properties and ensure they meet licensing conditions and therefore improve the living conditions for many private tenants. A fee is charged to landlords to cover the cost of administering such a scheme.
- 3- We are currently consulting on expanding Discretionary Licensing to the wards of Eastville and St George West. Consultation closes on 3rd November 2015. Verbal update available at the meeting. ## Part 2: Co-ordinating subgroup

- 5- The Co-ordinating subgroup met on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> September 2015. The group discussed the Community Development response to the NP Plan. The group also discussed the Mayor's Action Summary following his visit on 23<sup>rd</sup> July 2015 to the NP area.
- 6- Denis Wise who is now part of the Community Development Team and used to be the Neighbourhood Development Officer for the St George and Greater Fishponds NPs has been appointed to cover East and

Central area of the city. This area is ten wards area, stretching from Cabot, Clifton and Clifton East, to Greater Fishponds and St George NP areas.

- 7- Following the NP request to the Mayor and Community Development Team for a Community Development worker to specifically support East Park Resident Association with wider community engagement. We have received additional Community Development worker Raquib Khandker to work with the group for 6 months after which will be reviewed.
- 8- Moreover, the Community Development Team is also focussing on citywide Equalities & Community Cohesion, Active Citizen and Neighbourhoods whilst using Asset Based Community Development (ABCD) Approach.
- 9- Due to limited resources they confirmed that they will not be able to progress all of the NP Plan priorities. However they have agreed to take on Families and Young People P1, Activity 2; Community Cohesion & Development P1 Activity 3, P1 (Helping and supporting existing community events) and P3 (Celebrate Community Volunteering); Community buildings and facilities P1 Activity 1 and Activity 3; Crime and Community Safety P1 Activity 3 and Environment P1 Activity 8. Where relevant regular updates will be provided to Neighbourhood Partnership meetings. See agenda item 7 for an update.
- 10- When discussed the M32 Junction 2 roundabout and Eastgate Retail Park, which are in the Action Summary from the Mayor's visit, the group highlighted that there is a real need for a joint approach between the Greater Fishponds and Lockleaze & Horfield NPs to work on this project. The Mayor also agreed to cosign a support letter.
- 11- It was suggested to invite the businesses to an environment themed meeting rather than writing them a letter to request financial contribution to enhance the roundabout. The NP is asked for steer on this.

#### Part 3: Environment

12- The Environment Sub-Group met on Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> August 2015.

- 13- The group is currently reviewing the Parks Investment Plan, first created in 2011 from the Area Green Space Plan. Although the full plan was not adopted by Bristol City Council, it was agreed in October 2011 for element to be progressed under the Neighbourhood Partnership structure. At the next meeting of the Environmental Subgroup in November the group will be agreeing and prioritising the remaining actions and bringing completed projects to closure.
- 14- The Environmental Subgroup is also working with the event organisers who have used Eastville Park this year to make recommendations on where the funding collected from these event should be reinvested into Eastville Park.
- 15- Subsequently the Neighbourhood Partnership received a letter from Bristol TreeForum providing an update of a citywide Street Tree Planting scheme, which they have been working on. BCC Tree Bristol team is seeking NP support for their Street Tree proposal presented in appendices A & B map showing proposed locations and notes for the map and the letter from TreeForum.
- 16- Finally this year there is an aspiration to have winter planters in key high street locations, including Fishponds Rd and Lodge Causeway shopping districts. The NP also received a request from local residents from Stonebridge Park to have planters installed as part of a healthier, safer street project they currently working on. However the NP allocated all its Environment budget.
- 17- The Neighbourhood Committee is hereby asked to approve Officer recommendation summarised below.

## **Part 4: Community Buildings:**

19- Downend Amateur Boxing Club applied to the council in 2014 for a lease of Oldbury Court Community Centre (through Community Asset Transfer). The council has in principle approved a 15-year Lease, linked to a Service Agreement, subject to the club obtaining funding and carrying out renovation works within a reasonable time. An urgent meeting is now needed to discuss the timescale and the next steps, in order to meet the requirements of Sport England and other potential funders. A representative of the Greater

Fishponds NP is asked to be part of this process and to attend a meeting with club officials and council officers on Monday 12th October.

### **Part 5: Wellbeing Grant:**

- 20- The Wellbeing subgroup met on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> of June 2015.
- 21- At present the total amount of Wellbeing Grant available for the remainder of 2015/16 financial year is £10,038.55. This is because the NP received back £3,084 which was allocated to Pondlife. Their planning application was turned down and therefore are unable to pursue with the project. The NP also received back £999 allocated to Beechwood Club.
- 22- In total three applications were assessed by the panel with the total value of £10,309. The group's recommendation is summarised in the table shown below "Funding Appraisal Top Sheet".
- 23- The NC is asked to approve recommendations from the Wellbeing Panel summarised in the table shown below.

- 25- If the NC approve the Wellbeing subgroup's recommendation of £2,035 the NP will have £8,003.55 remaining in the Wellbeing Grant budget.
- 26- As part of the Wellbeing Subgroup members Mo Lewis, Scot Jacobs-Lange and Bradley Wilde assessed the Wellbeing applications.

#### Part 6: Bristol Arena Consultation

- 27- A four week programme of public consultation on plans for the new Bristol Arena will run from 16 September to 13 October.
- 28- The Bristol Arena will be a 12,000 capacity venue hosting over 100 events a year. These events will be a mixture of music, comedy, family entertainment and sports and the proposed arena can seamlessly convert into a smaller, more intimate 5000 seat venue. The Arena development includes proposals for improved transport links into the area, including new pedestrian and cycle routes. The area surrounding the Arena will be transformed over time into a vibrant, mixed use space that encourages daytime and evening use.

- 29- The development proposals will be the subject of two separate planning applications a full planning application for the Arena and an outline application for mixed-use development on the remainder of the Arena Island site. In advance of these planning applications the Council would like to share the emerging proposals and invite feedback from key stakeholders, groups and organisations with an interest, as well as the local community and the wider public, to help inform the final plans.
- 30- The public consultation will be focussed around an exhibition of the proposals and at www.bristoltemplequarter.com/arenaconsultation where people can see the plans and comment online. A printed copy of the consultation material will also be available in local libraries.
- 31- The main exhibition will be at the Customer Service Point, 100 Temple Street, on weekdays from Thursday 17 September until Tuesday 13 October, with staffed early evening public drop-in sessions on 23 September and 1 October from 6pm 7.30pm. The same exhibition will also be on display in the Galleries on Saturday 26 September and as a stand-alone exhibition in the main foyer of the Central Library from 28 September until 13 October.

  - 36- As you are aware the working group have been meeting up to plan this event and we are now in a position to ask all NPs to take part in three key activities:
    - i. **ASK 1:** We would like each NP to identify 2 people who would be willing to take the one hour Speaking on the Radio training session which will lead into actually speaking on the radio about the event and the world of NPs in general.
  - 37- There will then be an opportunity between end of October and Christmas for each NP to have a slot on a breakfast show to discuss their NP and publicise the work that you are doing, recruit more people to your forums and working groups (each NP will have the chance to plan this input to suit their needs)
    - ii. ASK 2: The group have agreed the concept for the Exhibition is to be about showing a problem, and then the solution that the NP has worked to achieve. the Exhibition needs 14 different posters (one A2 poster per NP with 1, 2 or 3 pictures about something great that they have achieved). This is to illustrate how working together to solve an issue can bring about positive change or bring many people together. It is important that we do not duplicate projects, so request that each NP send in 2 or 3 case studies (a short paragraph of what the issue was and how it was solved) and some pictures so that the group can pick the best combination of pictures and ensure 14 different case studies.

# Note to Greater Fishponds Neighbourhood Partnership 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2015

The University of Bristol have committed £60,000 to fund tree planting across the city over the next three years. Greater Fishponds NP has been selected as one of six NP to receive support this year. It was decided to prioritise tree planting to replace existing tree stumps or fill empty tree pit i.e. to plant in locations where there has been a tree until recently. Site surveys were undertaken by University of Bristol students under a volunteer programme and this has been checked by Council staff. We are now able to confirm that a total of nine (9) locations have been selected for planting in your Neighbourhood Partnership, see below.

The University of Bristol funding will pay to purchase, plant, protect and water each tree for two years. The trees will typically be 3 metres tall when planted.

The next step is to remove any tree stumps. It is then expected that all trees identified with the Greater Fishponds NP area will be planted by the end of December 2015. It may still prove necessary to adjust this list should underground utilities prove to be a constraint.

Further, there is an offer from the University to provide information / education about some of the trees being planted in each NP area; details will be provided in due course.

We are grateful to the support from the University of Bristol which will see 60 trees planted across the city this winter.

#### Street Tree Planting

Since you prioritised trees some amazing things have happened in your Partnership!

- 1. Bristol University has agreed to sponsor some tree planting in neighbourhood partnerships that have prioritised trees, which includes yours. Unfortunately students from Bristol University weren't able to survey the stumps and tarmac covered tree pits in your Neighbourhood, so I did instead!. These sites have been reviewed by the Council (TreeBristol) and they will bring a paper to your next Partnership meeting requesting that you approve planting of trees in the locations described in the paper. The costs of the planting will be fully covered by the University of Bristol.
- 2. Highways Department have started local traffic schemes again (which is good news in itself) and we have requested they automatically plan new trees into such schemes, build outs for example, unless services or sight lines mean it is not possible. The cost of a tree pit when work is being done is usually small, even minimal, compared to the cost of the scheme itself. You will still need to fund the tree; that can come from S106, CIL, your own NP funds or you can apply to Bristol University for help in 2016. (In the longer term we hope there will be other donors too). At this stage all we ask please is that you write to Highways and ask them to put in tree pits in new schemes wherever possible.

So replacement trees and now new trees in new locations; as we expect this process to continue over the coming years we need to build a community in each Neighbourhood Partnership that supports tree planting. The TreeForum will ask Neighbourhoods Dept. to see if they will contact those on their mailing list to find out if others are interested to help continue this process. And maybe you have someone who would like to be the lead (or joint lead) contact, currently we don't have anyone specifically designated as Tree Champion for your area; Joseph Glasgow has expressed an interest.

The Bristol TreeForum would like to thank you for prioritising trees, thank Bristol University, and thank the Council's Highways and Tree Bristol Departments for coming together and using this Green Capital Year to start off a process that will help your Neighbourhood, and Bristol, to become an ever better place to live and work in.
