NEIGHBOURHOOD COMMITTEE ITEMS

1. WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS, APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Cllr Jenny Smith took the Chair due to Cllr Brenda Massey status as Cabinet Member for Children and Young Peoples Services.

2. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

See above.

3. PUBLIC FORUM

None received.

4. SOUTH GLOUCESTERSHIRE DEVELOPMENT - OPEN MEETING ON 5TH JUNE 2013: DISCUSSION

The Neighbourhood Partnership considered a report of the Area Co-ordinator (agenda item no. 4) giving an update on the South Gloucestershire development.

Keith Houghton (KH) Area Co-ordinator referred to the event to be held in North Bristol to consider concerns related to the South Gloucestershire Development. Members were asked to highlight particular issues of concern and the following was noted;

- Public Transport routes need to be put in place early in the development and the inclusion of Henbury Station as part of the loop;

- The need for a phased development to allow for the development of facilities; schools, shops, Doctor surgeries, drainage etc
- The footpath through Cribbs Causeway to Charlton Road should be maintained;
- The hedges would need protecting. Tree Protections Orders (TPO) in the areas would need clarifying.
- Large scale maps of the plans would be available at the 5th June event.
- Concerns about access through Charlton Road
- Charlton Common concerns – development of this site and potential school on the site?
- Would there be sufficient off-street parking on the development?

Action – The AC to clarify if Tree Protection Orders were in place.

Cllr Weston suggested that the NP collate a formal response following the event tomorrow. The item would be added to the agenda for the next meeting.

THE NEIGHBOURHOOD COMMITTEE RESOLVED -

- (1) **that the update and drop-in events which have been organised with South Gloucestershire Council in North Bristol to enable residents to hear about the developments and comment on the financial statement be noted; and**
- (2) **that the Neighbourhood Partnership submit a formal response to the proposals following the event.**

5. BRISTOL YOUTH LINKS DELIVERY AND PROGRESS ON COMMUNITY ASSET TRANSFER

The Neighbourhood Partnership received a presentation (agenda item no. 5) by Learning Partnership West on Bristol Youth Links Delivery and progress on Community Asset Transfer.

Rose Richards (RR), BCC Service Manager, Bristol Youth Links was in attendance with Peter De Boer (PD), BCC Senior Youth & Community Worker.

The NP Members were provided with a presentation (appendix a to the minutes) from LPW; issues related to the transfer of services were noted. Work continued to take place, including a new Referral Response service and targeted support. The majority of services continued as before.

The presentation provided information on the number of young people who had received services. The LPW representative acknowledged the residents request that future information should focus on the areas of Henbury,

Southmead and Brentry. However, BCC had commissioned the service to consider all of the Northern Arc of Bristol, covering 12,000 young people.

Following a number of questions, the following was noted;

- The LPW Rep noted that the services provided in the day mainly focused on those young people who are 'NEET' (Not in Education, Employment or Training).
- 'Significant contact' referred to face to face engagement –when a worker linked directly to the young people. 'Non significant contact' referred to non contact work; phone calls, liaison with agencies, letter writing etc.
- Residents and Cllrs expressed concerns about the amount of provision available.
- The LPW Rep acknowledged the anxiety of the residents and highlighted that changes would continue to take place to meet the needs of the community.
- The BCC Youth worker highlighted that services had reduced prior to the start of the LPW contract. Residents suggested that the area had been neglected by BCC.
- LPW had made a strategic decision to continue the services unchanged while staff changes took place. LPW Representatives were attending the NP meeting to hear the views of the residents so the services could be developed within the budgetary requirements.
- Reference was made to the increase in Anti Social Behaviour (ASB) since the closure of the Youth Clubs. Lee Paterson, Avon and Somerset Police, re-iterated that the police had noticed a difference in Southmead; partnership work would be required to take place with Children and Young Peoples Service (CYPS) to address the issues. Continuity of staff was essential; youth work in Southmead would be complex, issues related to welfare were large. Work with LPW had been positive but more community work would be required. Residents could find it challenging to work with LPW as previous staff had been made redundant.
- LPW reiterated the commitment to work with partners to address the concerns noted. The recruited staff were skilled and professional and would work with the community.
- Residents were concerned about the lack of activities available and the poor communication between LPW and residents. The LPW Rep highlighted that the plan was not finished and would be re-considered following liaison with residents. Reprioritisation would be considered and a volunteer programme developed.
- LPW focused on the 'Trusted Adult Model' and focused more on one to one work, rather than sessions in buildings. During the commissioning process, BCC had requested a more targeted service.
- Cllr Windows expressed concern over the transitional arrangements; residents were not kept updated and Cllrs were unhappy with the processes.
- LPW were confident that the problematic situation could be improved following liaison with residents, Councillors, paid / unpaid workers and other partners.

- The summer holiday activities schedule would be published by the 21st June and circulated to Members via the Area Co-ordinator. LPW were asked to engage with groups such as the BS10 youth forum.
- The LPW rep highlighted that positive outcomes were achievable and referred to a case study. One to one work would be important in addition to group sessions.
- ASB was noted as big concern of residents and work with partnership agencies such as the police would be a priority. The work of PCSOs was invaluable.
- Reference was made to a forthcoming Youth Issues meeting in Southmead. The meeting was arranged to identify gaps in provision and to highlight acute issues. Henbury and Brentry Councillors were encouraged to arrange a comparable meeting in their Wards.
- The LPW rep was invited to attend the Southmead Festival in July.
- Residents re-iterated that young people in the area needed a venue to congregate. The work in neighbouring areas affected each other.
- LPW were asked to provide further information on the proportion of work taking place in the area against the number of people living in the area.

Rose Richard provided information on the process for applying for an asset transfer. Tranche one would consider Southmead Youth Centre and wording would include conditions related to providing services for young people. Workshops would take place in June and July to provide details on the application process, deadlines for expressions of interest would be the end of July. Decisions would be expected in November. More time had been provided for Brentry Lodge, partnerships would be considered. Revenue costs would be considered if a strong case was presented. There would be further discussions related to how groups were charged for using buildings. To date, BCC were not charging existing organisations but new organisations were being asked to contribute. Charging young people to use the facilities and then re-investing the money would be considered. The Station was a good example of a venue who earned a revenue stream from events such as parties etc.

Appendix B attached provides a flipchart record of comments/ questions/ answers during the meeting.

Action – LPW to provide information on the proportion of work taking place with young people in the area against the number of people living in the area.

THE NEIGHBOURHOOD COMMITTEE RESOLVED -

- (1) that the presentation by Learning Partnership West on its delivery plans for Bristol Youth Link services in Henbury, Brentry and Southmead for youth and play be noted.**

6. WELLBEING REPORT

The Neighbourhood Partnership considered a report of the Area Co-ordinator (agenda item no. 9) setting out the wellbeing report.

The NP Members agreed that an additional meeting would be held on the 2nd July 2013. This would be required to consider a further wellbeing application for Summer Activities and to consider the South Gloucestershire development. Cllrs Massey and Windows noted their apologies for the 2nd July.

The NP Members considered the Wellbeing report and the following was noted;

- The football club were not awarded the full amount. They had received previous grants and were active in the community. Information was requested on the total amount of money allocated to the group in the last five years.
- Money could only be awarded to those groups who made applications.

Action – The AC to provide information on the total amount of Wellbeing funding awarded to the football club in the previous five years.

THE NEIGHBOURHOOD COMMITTEE RESOLVED –

- (1) that the current Wellbeing financial statement/budget be noted;
- (2) that the recommendations from the Southmead Steering Group Wellbeing Assessment Panel set out in item 2 be approved and the applications not recommended for funding agreed;
- (3) that the recommendations from the Henbury/Brentry Wellbeing Assessment Panel set out in item 3 be approved and the applications not recommended for funding approved;
- (4) that the contributions which the projects recommended for funding make to fulfil the public sector equality duty set out in item 6 be noted;
- (5) that the recommendations to hold an additional NP meeting to consider an application for the use of Joint Holiday Activity funding be approved; and
- (6) that the legal information which guides all decisions about Wellbeing grant funding be noted.

7. LOCAL INFORMATION UPDATES

A bench dedicated to Lesley Lenton, Youth Worker would be erected on the 24th June. The bench would be located on Glencoyne Square. .

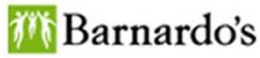

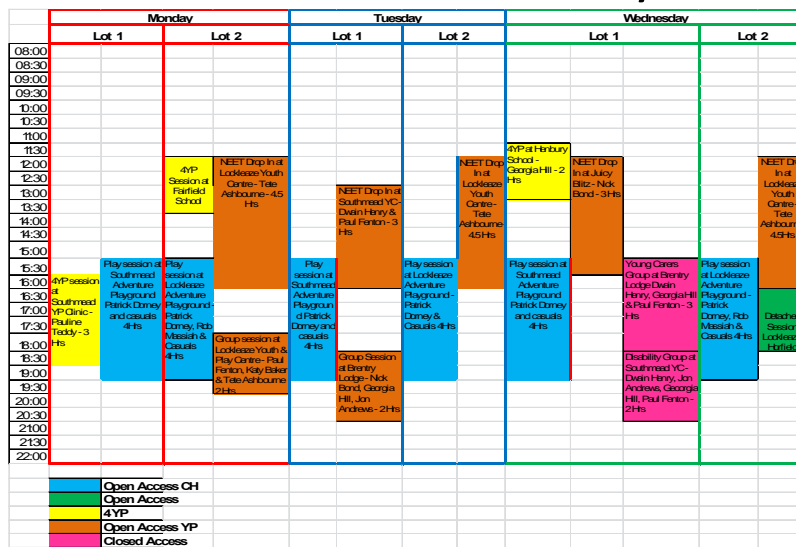

Trusted Adult Model

- “After our first one to one session it was clear to me that more than anything else what Jo needed was someone to talk to about her concerns and fears, someone that wouldn’t judge her, that she could trust and confide in. For Jo I became her trusted adult, we spoke about her anxiety, low self esteem, self harming, and her fear of outside. As our rapport grew, I established that a lot of Jo’s worries came from a childhood incident and being bullied by another young girl.”

Henbury and Southmead Neighbourhood Partnership Meeting 4th June 2013

Learning Partnership West Bristol Youth Links presentation flipchart record of comments/questions/answers during the meeting

- Meeting asked for Henbury/Brentry and Southmead specific figures in future
- Mark Weston: for Henbury/Brentry there is just 1 open access session and 1 session for young carers. Feels that Henbury/Brentry is being ignored
- Learning Partnership West emphasised that they also deliver one-to-one work with young people apart from group sessions
- Meeting asked how this service compared with the previous one. Pete de Boer replied: 'it's a slight reduction'
- Concern raised about a future increase in ASB in Henbury following on from reduced youth work
- Adam C (LPW): wants to work out what the area wants
- ASB in Southmead: up 10% over the last year
- Jenny S: more groups of young people seen around on streets
- Lee P (police): the main partner for dealing with ASB has been the Youth Services in the past
- Lee P; Open Access youth sessions are the key in Southmead
- There are big welfare issues for young people in Southmead
- Concern that the quantity and continuity of youth work isn't here now
- Adam C (LPW): we have recruited skilled staff.
- Pauline Teddy: £56K from Positive Futures is going into Southmead to support her work
- LPW do targeted work with 'at risk' young people
- Point made that LPW need to listen to the community – people feel there are more young people out of school now
- There's a need to build services together
- Need more communication about what is happening
- Question: is the current delivery plan the final shape of services or is it a starting point?

- Adam C (LPW): it's not the finished plan – it's a 3-month plan. If we need to refocus to meet needs then we'll do that
- LPW are developing a volunteer programme
- Henbury and Brentry: sessions used to go on 3 times a week
- Concern expressed about Henbury/Brentry being at risk
- Pete de Boer: some young people to travel to clubs
- Comment about emphasis on 1-1 work by LPW: 'young people need fun'
- There is other youth provision in the area
- Kristian B: asked LPW to consider using more volunteers to provide extra sessions at the Youth Centres
- Question: will LPW make a commitment to maintain the existing provision? Adam C (LPW): yes
- Summer Activities: LPW will release their summer activities programme on 21st June. **LPW will e-mail out the information**
- Will LPW work with the Youth Forum? Adam C (LPW): yes
- And with other community groups
- Consultation with young people using services needs to take place
- BS10 Youth Forum: LPW confirmed they will maintain it.
- Focus for future work from Bristol Youth Links:
 - ASB
 - Tracking – LPW work with other organisations to help identify individual young people who may be helped by their services
- Youth Issues Meeting: Lee P explained briefly that in Southmead they are reviving the Youth Issues meeting where practitioners get together to work through concerns and decide how to respond.
- LPW need to attend/be part of these meetings
- Pete de Boer: explained that the ASB multi-agency meetings are referring cases to LPW's services
- Community wants to see youth workers out in the community
- PCSOs – good links with them are needed
- Adam C(LPW): there is a new Manager for the North: Angela Higgins
- Suggestion that LPW attend the Southmead Festival and the Henbury/Brentry Fun Day

- Youth Centres: question asked about whether LPW will pay rent to use the youth centres? Chris C (LPW): confirmed LPW will pay rent.
- Case study presentation: meetings welcomed the one-to-one work – it's good and necessary.
- But Henbury noted that they don't get mentioned much
- Question from meeting: what's the proportion of 'vulnerable' young people to 'non-vulnerable' young people?

Community Asset Transfer (CAT): Rose Richards

- Southmead Youth Centre is in first wave of CAT
- If the CAT happens successfully (ie. if a community organisation manages to put forward a successful business case for being able to take on and run the building so the financial income/expenditure works) then the youth centre will continue to provide a space for young people in Southmead
- There are organisations interested in bidding for Southmead Youth Centre
- Brentry Lodge: they are being given more time in Henbury/Brentry.
- BCC will advertise to ask for Expressions of Interest in the buildings
- A capital fund is available – in the business case bidders put forward they can 'tell BCC what you need to make your proposal workable' . RR confirmed this could include a revenue request from the funding pot available
- Question to RR: if LPW are using the buildings rent-free at present why is BCC charging community groups who are using the building at present?
