Application for the Grant of Street Trading Consent at Crowdace Properties, The Corner, Third Way, Avonmouth Applicant: George Burman

Proposed trading name: Fast Food Avonmouth

Report of the Director of Neighbourhoods

Purpose of Report

1. To determine an application for the grant of a street trading consent at the following location: Crowdace Properties, The Corner, Third Way, Avonmouth

Background

- 2. With effect from 1 May 2009 the above location has been designated as a consent street for the purpose of Schedule 4 to the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982. Any street trading at that location other than under a street trading consent issued by the Council would constitute a criminal offence.
- General conditions which would be attached to a consent if granted are at Appendix A.
- The application form is attached at Appendix B. Photographs of the unit are attached at Appendix C and a site location plan at Appendix D.
- 5. On 29 January 2012 Wayne Jones, Licensing Enforcement Officer for Bristol City Council noted the presence of a burger van whilst driving through Avonmouth. He checked the details held at the Licensing Office and found that this trader did not appear to have a consent. Mr Jones then made a visit to the site with Peter Hogarth, also a Licensing Enforcement Officer for Bristol City Council on 31 January 2012. They spoke with the trader at the site, Mr George Burman, and advised him that he was required to have consent by Bristol City Council to conduct any form of street trading. They also provided him with the appropriate application forms for a street

trading consent.

- 6. Mr Jones also sent Mr Burman a letter on 8 February 2012 informing him he did not have consent from Bristol City Council to trade at that location and enclosing the relevant application forms and application procedure.
- 7. On 8 February 2012 George Burman applied for a street trading consent which, if granted, would enable the applicant to trade lawfully at the above location. The applicant has applied to sell the following goods

Hot Food:

During the hours of 0700 to 1300 from Monday to Friday and 0700 to 1200 Saturday

- 8. Mr Jones made a subsequent visit to this site on 17 February 2012 with Mark Flower, Licensing Officer for Bristol City Council, and witnessed Mr Burman trading from the site. Further details of this visit can be found in Mr Jones statement, which can be found at Appendix E.
- 9. Mr Jones made another visit to the site on 21 February 2012, in the company of Ian Wilkinson, Licensing Enforcement Co-ordinator for Bristol City Council. On this occasion Mr Wilkinson conducted a test purchase and was able to purchase a burger. Mr Jones and Mr Wilkinson approached Mr Burman and cautioned him. They completed an on-site interview sheet which is attached at Appendix G. During this interview Mr Burman admitted that he did not have consent to trade at that location, and that he did not intend to stop trading. Further details of this visit can be found in Mr Jones statement at Appendix E and Mr Wilkinson's statement at Appendix F.
- 10. Whilst off duty on 10 March 2012 Mr Jones witnessed Mr Burman trading from his van at the location in question. Mr Jones' statement to that effect can be found at Appendix H

11. Consultation

10. Consultation Responses

No adverse representations were received as a result of this consultation.

11. Schedule 4 to the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 deals with street trading consents. Subject to certain exemptions that do not apply to this application, Paragraph 7 enables the Council to grant a consent if they think fit. The Council may attach such conditions as they consider necessary, which may include among other things conditions to prevent obstruction of the street or danger to persons using it, nuisance or annoyance etc. A consent may include permission for its holder to trade in a consent street from a stationery van, car, barrow or other vehicle, or from a portable stall. Unless such permission is included the Act prohibits a consent holder trading from a van or other vehicle or from a stall, barrow or cart.

If such a permission is included then the Council may include conditions

- (a) as to where the holder of the street trading consent may trade by virtue of the permission; and
- (b) as to the times between which or periods for which he may so trade.

A street trading consent may be granted for any period not exceeding 12 months but may be revoked at any time. The holder of a street trading consent may at any time surrender his consent to the Council and it shall then cease to be valid.

12. Mr Burman has been provided with a copy of the report and has been invited to the meeting.

GENERAL CONDITIONS THAT WILL NORMALLY BE ATTACHED TO STREET TRADING CONSENTS

The consent holder shall only trade on the days and between the times stated on the consent.

- 1. The consent holder shall only trade in the description of articles stated on the consent.
- The consent holder shall not carry on business on any street so as to cause obstruction or cause danger to people using the street.
- 4. The consent holder shall not carry on business from any vehicle or erect or place any stall or other structure in any street except in the area mentioned in the consent.
- The consent holder shall not sell, offer or expose for sale any goods or articles other than those described within the principle terms of this consent.
- 6. The consent holder shall on all occasions, when carrying on business, be strictly sober, and conduct him/herself in a proper, civil and courteous manner, and he/she shall not carry on his/her business in such a way as to cause annoyance to the occupier or person in charge of any shop, business, resident, or any person using the street.
- 7. The consent holder shall at all times conduct his/her business and position any vehicle used by him/her in connection with his/her business in such a manner that no danger is likely to arise to persons trading or intending to trade.
- 8. The consent holder shall at all times conduct his/her business in a clean and tidy manner.
- 9. The consent holder shall ensure that a copy of the consent is clearly visible to the public.
- 10. The consent holder shall not permit any person to assist him/her in his/her trading unless the details of that person have been supplied to the Licensing Authority. Any such person shall be issued with an identification badge by the Licensing Authority.

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- 11. If, during the currency of any consent any material change occurs in the facts of which particulars and information were contained in, or given along with, the application for the consent, the holder of the consent shall report such changes to the Licensing Authority within 72 hours of that change.
- 12. Any motor vehicle used for the purpose of street trading shall at all times be in a roadworthy condition and have the relevant documents i.e insurance, tax and MOT to make the use of that vehicle on a road legal. These documents will be produced by the consent holder to any police officer or authorised officer of the Council.
- 13. Neither the consent holder nor any assistant shall display merchandise which is likely to cause offence or distress to any other person or which would be deemed an offence under any other legislation.
- 14. A consent holder selling food shall at all times comply with any food hygiene regulations in force at that time, and when required by the Licensing Authority, shall produce appropriate food handling certificates.
- 15. The city Council reserves the right to alter or amend these conditions at any time.
- 16. The subletting of any consent is prohibited.
- 17. The consent holder shall be responsible for the temporary storage of refuse, liquid and other material accumulated or created whilst trading and its subsequent removal from the site. The removal and disposal must be to the satisfaction of the Council.
- 18. The consent holder shall not cause any nuisance or annoyance to persons using the street.
- 19. The consent holder, if intending to sell food from a stationery vehicle/stall shall operate from a purpose made vehicle/stall constructed and managed so as to comply with the relevant hygiene regulations currently in force within the provisions of the Food Safety Act 1990, and any subsequent changes to those regulations.



I am a Licensing Enforcement Officer employed by Bristol City Council at their premises at Princess House, Princess Street, Bedminster, Bristol, BS3 4AG.

On 21 February 2012 at 11:00hrs, in the company with Ian Wilkinson Licensing Enforcement Coordinator, we were parked near a burger van parked on the junction of Third Way and St Andrew's Road, Avonmouth. Ian Wilkinson left my vehicle to conduct a test purchase. A few minutes later he returned to my vehicle with a burger in his hand costing £3.00. We both then approached the van where I saw a male, whom I had spoken to previously on the 17 February, called Mr GEORGE BURMAN of 21 STATION ROAD, PILNING BS354JT.

We both introduced ourselves, then I cautioned him and asked whether he understood the caution, to which he replied yes. I completed an on site interview sheet, and have exhibited this as WJ1.

I said "Have you got trading consent to be here?"

He said "I've never had anything from Bristol City Council"

I then said "You were delivered a letter stating that you had to have consent to trade, you do not have consent"

Continuation of witness statement W Jones

He stated "Yes I know, I'm not going to shut down". I then informed him that he would be reported for the offence of trading without consent. We then left the burger van.


On 17 February 2012 at 11:20hrs in the company with Mark Flower, Licensing Officer with Bristol City Council, we visited the burger van on Third Way and spoke to Mr Burman regarding his continuation of trading. I noticed at the time of the visit that a dozen sausages were grilling on the stove. I stated that he did not have consent to trade without being authorised to do so. He stated that he had a family and a mortgage to keep and could not afford to shut for 14 days. We both then left the burger van and pulled into the petrol station opposite where I witnessed two males, one female purchasing food from the van.

On 8 February 2012 I posted a letter addressed to Mr Burman informing him that he did not have consent from Bristol City Council to trade from his van. The letter also contained the appropriate application form and notes of how to apply for street trading consent. Mr Burman acknowledged that he had received the letter and application form as he telephoned me at the Licensing Office and informed me that he had received the pack. I exhibit the letter as WJ2.

On 31 January 2012, the burger van was visited in the company with Peter Hogarth, Licensing Enforcement Officer, where Mr George Burman was given a street trading application pack and informed that he had to have consent by Bristol City council to conduct in any form of street trading.

On Sunday 29 January 2012 whilst driving through Avonmouth, I spotted a burger van parked at the junction with Third Way and St Andrew's Road Avonmouth. I have attached a photograph, exhibited as WJ3, at the time of passing, the van was closed and made a mental note to check the database at the office the following week.

I am a Licensing Enforcement Co-ordinator employed by Bristol City Council and based at the above location.

Statement of Ian Wilkinson, Page Two

While Mr Jones waited in his vehicle I approached a food trailer in the communal parking area near the service road off Third Way, and almost opposite the petrol station. I saw a male person, who I now know to be the defendant George Burman working behind the counter. I saw some sausages cooking on a hot plate towards the front of the counter, and other foodstuffs and drinks displayed. Having asked Mr Burman if he had any bacon I said 'Can I have a bacon bap, please'. Mr Burman placed three rashers of bacon on the hot plate and they started cooking. When they had cooked Mr Burman placed them in a bread roll and handed it to me in a bag. I said 'Three pounds, is that right', and handed him that amount, for which he thanked me.

I then returned to the vehicle and spoke to Mr Jones. Together we then went to the trailer where we spoke to Mr Burman. After establishing his personal details he was cautioned and asked if he understood. He replied 'Yes'. Mr Jones said 'Have you trading consent to be here?' Mr Burman replied 'I've never had anything from BCC'. Mr Jones then said 'You were delivered a letter stating that you had to have consent to trade, you do not have consent'.

Mr Burman replied 'Yes I know, I'm not going to shut down'. Mr Jones then said 'You will be reported for the offence'. Mr Burman made no reply.

As the conversation continued Mr Jones made notes on an On Site Interview Form [exhibit WJ1], which we both signed. At the end of the conversation Mr Burman was asked to sign the form as being an accurate record, but refused to do so.
