Legal Information

Summary of applications considered by the Wellbeing sub-group for the September 2013 SGNP meeting

1. Balance of funding after fast track applications

After the allocation of funding at the last St George Neighbourhood Partnership meeting there is £12,997.59 left to be allocated.

2. Wellbeing sub-group appraisal of applications

The Wellbeing sub-group reviewed four grant applications. Please see the appraisal sheets with the meeting notes for the sub-group's recommendations. If all the recommendations are agreed by the St George councillors £9,101.53 will be left for the next round of applications.

a) 159th Brunel Scouts HQ grounds

Originally the 159th Brunel Scout's application was for £2,554.86. The group use the scout hut and field adjacent to St Aidan's church hall on Fir Tree Lane. Following a review of their application prompted by the Wellbeing sub-group the application has been revised to £1,400. The Scouts would like to improve parking on this site and prevent cars going beyond the parking area. They would also like to install improved fencing to prevent dog fouling and litter. Costs are for gating, weed control membrane, stone chippings and fencing. Labour would be carried out by volunteers.

b) Bristol and Anchor Almshouse Charity - updating equipment at the Beehive Centre.

A total of £972.06 has been requested to pay for a public address system to enable speakers to be heard properly at events in the hall at the Beehive Centre. The amount also includes the cost of 4 lightweight folding tables to replace existing, heavy and unsafe tables used at the Beehive Centre in Stretford Rd.

c) St Aidans with St George church - energy saying environmentally friendly lighting improvement

The St Aidan with St George church has asked for £874 to replace the lighting in their church hall. The current lighting is not energy efficient and lamp tubes need regular replacement. LED flood lighting will reduce running costs and thus keep costs low for groups hiring the hall. These hirers include a badminton group, scouts, cubs, beavers and many others. Payback on investment is expected within 2 years.

d) Friends of Troopers Hill - Special walks for the St George Strollers

Friends of Troopers Hill started the Walking for Health group, the St George Strollers in 2011. They initially requested £762 to fund a number of special walks, ideally one per quarter. These walks would include an expert guide and/or transport to places that are harder to reach from St George. These special walks are to encourage walkers to continue to attend and attract new walkers. After discussions with the Wellbeing sub-group the application is now for £650 and in common with all their walks there will be a charge for each person attending the walk of £2 to cover the group's running costs.

3. New member of the Wellbeing sub-group

Philip Bird, a member of the St George Neighbourhood Partnership and resident of St George West, has joined the Wellbeing sub-group. A full list of our 7 members is shown on http://www.stgeorgenp.org.uk/subgroups/wellbeing/. We currently have 3 vacancies and would welcome more new members.
