### 1. Amount Green Capital Funding available

There is £10,000 of Green Capital funding available for this funding round.

### 2. Wellbeing sub-group appraisal

In total 8 applications were assessed by the subgroup member. 6 applications were recommended for approval, subgroup members requested further information from the remaining 2 applications.

The total amount of funds requested far exceeds the amount available from the Green Capital fund.

A 9<sup>th</sup> application document was received which gives more detail about the Green Map proposal agreed at the last Neighbourhood Partnership meeting as a project to be supported if any Green Capital funding remained available.

Eight Green Capital appraisal documents containing the recommendations of the Wellbeing sub-group are shown in the appendix 1-8. NP members are asked to consider them before making decision.

If the recommendations of the Wellbeing sub-group are accepted £838.50 will be available for the Green Mapping project.

### 3. Subgroup recommendations.

The table shown below shows the list of applicants who have applied for funding, the amounts they applied for and the amounts recommended by the Wellbeing sub-group. In the final column "Y" indicates that the project met the criteria to be funded from either Wellbeing or Green Capital. This may be useful as a reference note if it is decided that the recommendations of the Wellbeing sub-group should not be followed.

### 7. Special Conditions:

This application was submitted with details of how it met both Wellbeing and Green Capital priorities. Summerhill Infants School does not meet the criteria to apply for Wellbeing funding unless they can be classed as "a community or voluntary group" and it was unclear whether the children would access the allotments in school-time which could mean this grant would replace statutory funding which again makes the application non-eligible for Wellbeing funding. The Wellbeing sub-group had insufficient information to properly assess this application for a Green Capital grant. At the time the Wellbeing sub-group met no quotations had been supplied giving a breakdown of the spend of £4,500 (a requirement on the application form is to supply 3 quotations for this value of application).

1. Name of Project: The Haven Regeneration Name of Applicant: The Haven

£1,535 to pay for gardening and woodworking equipment, web space and an open day event. The Haven is a 1.3 acre site providing a communal garden and relaxation spaces open to adults with issues surrounding mental health and/or alcohol and substance misuse. It is located in Greater Fishponds and has regular users of the facilities coming from St George, Greater Fishponds and other areas. Partner organisations such as Second Step, BSDAS (Bristol Specialist Drug and Alcohol Service), St Mungo's, BDP (Bristol Drug Project) and ROADS (Bristol Recovery Oriented Alcohol and Drugs Service) bring people to the site who sometimes return independently. The site does have security to protect any tools funded by this application.

### 7. Special Conditions:

This application was submitted with details of how it met both Wellbeing and Green Capital priorities. The Wellbeing sub-group had insufficient information to properly assess this application. Questions ranged from the ability to distribute over 20,000 items (postcards, posters, dog waste bags) to who would do how many neutering/ spaying operations and whether the organisation would be bringing in rescue dogs from overseas.

With more applications than funding available and no time drivers on this project the Wellbeing sub-group recommend that they spend time working with the applicant to result in a revised application for the next round of Wellbeing funding. Dog fouling is a very high priority for the St George Neighbourhood Partnership and the panel would like to support an effective project that could deliver a

decrease in the problem.
