Clean & Green budget have been used to support above stated priorities. The NP had £1,710 to spend this financial year of which the Neighbourhood Officer spent £1,182 in supporting above stated priorities, for full detailed break see appendix 1. The remaining £528 will be allocated supporting street trees (P5 activity 5), as per the Environment subgroup recommendation.

Approved by the Neighbourhood Committee in March 2012/13.	£70,218. 80	Construction was proposed in November / Dec 2014, unfortunately the most competitively priced contractor turned down the works, therefore, an invite has now been sent to the next contractor on the council's preferred list, who provisionally accepted the work and has suggested they may be able to start on site in April 2015 in Crews Hole Rd.

Project 5: Encouraging the set-up of Community Speed Watch, along hot spot areas.	0.00	Community Speedwatch Volunteers have now been trained, (although the group are keen to recruit more volunteers). PS Darren Warr is supporting the group with risk assessing CSW locations. PS Darren Warr is also now the Police Trainer for speed guns with Police Officers and will be looking to carry out as much of this training as possible in the St George area. The groups first Speedwatch took place on Friday 27 th Feb 2015.

Activity 1: Promote responsible Cycling via 4 cycle surgeries in areas where there is conflicts – Church Rd, cycle track and Avon Valley.		Cycling surgeries have now taken place at St George Park, Avon Valley Trail and Church Road. Further surgeries need planning for Summer at the Railway Path and one other location TBC. Also opportunities to run the safety / theft surgeries at existing planned events such as Barton Fields fun day and Redfest.

Activity 5: Develop more activities for people in the neighbourhood, including, Sport Coaching, Street games, etc. Target areas to include Meadow Vale and Dundridge Park. This was funded from an area wide budget.	£250	Doorstep Sports are offering volunteer coaching opportunities and training to local people. Creative Youth Network are now offering Open Access nights at the Kingswood Centre on Britannia Road. Access Sports, sponsored by Sovereign Housing are still offering weekly sports sessions, on Monday evenings, at Barton Hill RFC on Duncombe Lane targeting young people in Speedwell and Hillfields. The first Youth Activity / Provision Fair was held at Bristol Brunel Academy on 17 th January 2015. There was excellent participation by service providers but very disappointing attendance from young people themselves despite a significant publicity drive including posters, flyers and social media campaigns. There are plans to repeat this but at an event with guaranteed footfall such as Redfest or Dundridge Park Fun Day.
