Reduce on street litter and Flytipping: Activity 1: Identify hotspot areas.	Tom Ward Street Enforcement officer for St George dealt with recent reports in Church Road and flytipping issue near Crews Hole Road and towpath. Operation Secure was carried out on 8th October. Every business from Chalks Rd junction to Two Mile Hill Road were visited to check they were disposing of their waste legally and any businesses with a bin stored on the street receiving a legal notice tightening restrictions on their storage and
Activity 7: Organise 2 educational/awareness community clean-ups	maintenance. All businesses were written to in advance. 66 x produced the required evidence of disposal, 9 x received notices for bins stored on the pavement and a further 47 written to produce evidence of commercial waste disposal. A number of businesses were found to be depositing waste in the domestic waste stream. Any businesses not producing commercial waste contracts or Waste Transfer Notes will be receiving a Fixed-Penalty-Notice.
Activity 3 Monitor May Gurney contractor and report where it is not happening.	NO (Neighbourhood Officer) met with Steve Rogers regarding various paths not being weeded/cleared to standard required. Weeding completed in various locations including George and Dragon Lane (route into Gladstone Street park), Fir Tree Lane and Steps, and others reported by Susan Action-Campbell.
Activity 3 Improve condition of Public Right of Ways as part of the Green Capital Project.	Strawberry Lane foliage has been cleared, 2 x lighting columns installed (funded from Green Capital), trenching work and connections in the next 2 weeks. More pruning planned to complete route. 1.4 Priority 5: The NP has a range of areas that be	submitted a match funding application to SITA to improve the play area and a match funding application to Groundwork/Tesco for a path from the chicane gate to the play area. The group is currently working on another application for a Nature Path which is making good progress. Friends of Troopers Hill have sent grant applications to 2 funding bodies for amounts totalling £75,000 to fund a play area and access path on Troopers Hill Field. Both grant application depend on the funding of £15,000 already allocated by the St George Neighbourhood Partnership from Section 106 contributions. Friends of Troopers Hill will be advised whether the applications have been successful in March 2016. If either grant application is successful then a tender process to carry out the associated work will be done with the support of Bristol City Council. Contractors and suppliers will then be appointed and the work carried out, with the aim of completing part of the project if only one grant applications are granted, by the end of 2016.
