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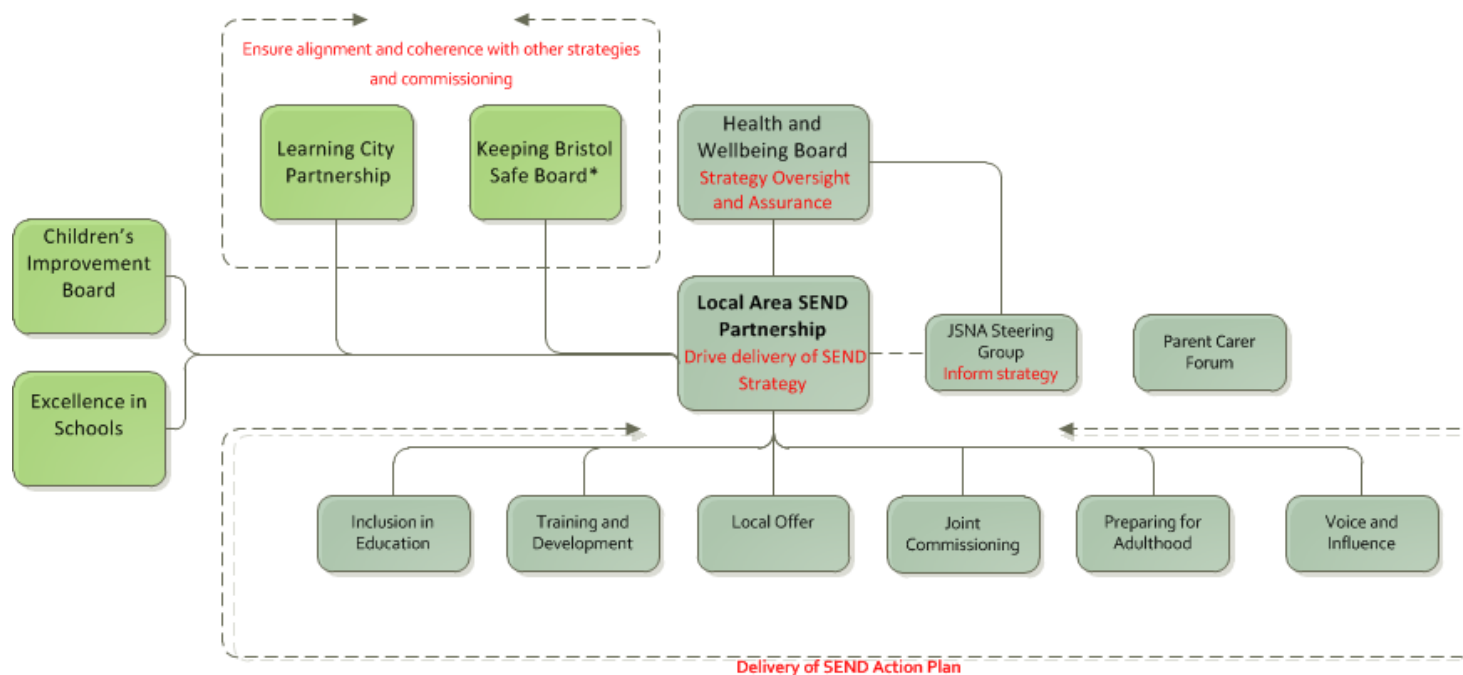
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Strategic Governance - Current Overview

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Bristol's Local Offer

Investment

Cabinet agreed £1.4m (£1 in this years budget and £400k in next year's budget as an interim position).

There will be further funding from April 2020, to deliver statutorily compliant and sustainable SEND services.
