1. Neighbourhood Plan

- a. The Neighbourhood Plan was created from an amalgamation of other plans covering various themes in the Dundry View area. We are coming to the end of year two of the current plan and have not yet reviewed the plan for its final year.
- b. The Neighbourhood Plan has been updated at the end of January 2017 and is available to view on-line at this page <https://www.bristol.gov.uk/people-communities/dundry-view-neighbourhood-partnership>
- c. With the cuts to Neighbourhood Partnership and new locally created structures forming I suggest using the Plan as a basis to review what the area still considers priorities and forming a new plan going forward.

2. Work Updates Jan – March 2017

- a. **Maceys Road (lane to Bishport Avenue)** Local resident Rep Hayley Ward helping to progress this with Partners and residents Linked work between Hengrove and Whitchurch Park ward and Hartcliffe ward.
Following many years of frustration of the location being a regular

dumping site for fly tip there is now a group (Reclaim Maceys) with aims of making a big difference to the area. Local people mainly in the Hartcliffe Ward are working with Knightstone Housing to make a change to the area. There has been one volunteer clear up day with others to follow, local people will do a regular litter pick and keep vegetation under control.

b. Payback work has been done in the following areas.

Valley Walk to remove fly tip and litter, clear vegetation ready for planting small trees

Crosscombe Road open space. Clear fly tip that has continually been a problem due the waste contractor not being able to remove from the thick vegetation.

Kings Head Park. Clearing vegetation and preparation of areas for the One Tree Per Child team to plant trees.

Withywood Park Clearing fly tip and lots of litter in areas of scrub and wooded areas.

c. Access Works from The Mayors Fund 2015/16

Valley Walk, New access points at Whitchurch Lane and Fulford Road

Headley Park. A new path and upgraded path to the children's play area

d. S106 spend from Imperial Park development

Crox Bottom New steps and path giving improved access from Broadleas to Crox Bottom and Imperial Park.

e. One Tree Per Child

Planting has taken place at Kings Head Park and Valley Walk

3. Local Action

a. Petition to Full Council February 2017

Jim Hodgson from HWCP has supported residents who wanted to protest and make a statement concerning the cuts and the impact it would have on the local area.

b. Mayoral conversation

The Mayor Marvin Rees came to an open meeting on 9th March at the Withywood Centre over 70 local residents attended, priority themes included local democracy, Highways and transport, council services, Green Space, Education, training and learning and Health and Wellbeing.
