
Definition

A developing approach to safeguarding children at risk of extra-familial abuse, including child sexual exploitation, criminal exploitation, trafficking, radicalisation, hate crime, bullying and online abuse.

Safeguarding includes peer groups, locations, neighbourhoods and school environments where harm happens rather than focussing on the individual in their family context.


Working nationally and with partners

- Operation Topaz: police led response to Child Sexual Exploitation, expanding to include Criminal Exploitation






Victim Demographics






Ethnicity

Aims – Safer Options Team Development

- To ensure a comprehensive understanding of child criminal exploitation including who is involved and where it is taking place.
- To gather intelligence about serious youth crime from all relevant stakeholders, including the community.
- To take a partnership approach to disrupting crime and bring offenders to justice.
- To protect vulnerable people from knife crime.
- To engage all our communities in playing a more active role
- To raise awareness with the public and all relevant professionals.
- To work with all relevant stakeholders including the private sector.
- To support the development of appropriate rehabilitative interventions.

To date:

- 182 interventions with 107 children across the city.
- 207 children have been discussed to ensure adequate support in place
- Joining up intelligence across Council/Police systems:
 - 64 most vulnerable
 - 38 in vulnerable cohort
 - 93 cause for concern
- Supporting existing networks and delivering enhancements where required:
 - 7 community mentors and 16 young people matched (3 more completing their training)
 - working with educational providers to ensure appropriate education provision
 - Joint work with voluntary sector organisations
 - Preparation for mentoring and support to engage 8 young people. 3 more mentors are completing their training and will soon be working with young people
 - Targeted group work sessions, including work with the 24's (gang), a young women's group and a GRT group

Operation Topaz – Andri Nicolaou A&S Police

- Intelligence and data led
- Disruption of perpetrators
- Support to victims
- Recognised as innovative model of best practice (National Working Group 2018)
- Outreach work Prevention and Coordination Officer
 - Proactively seeking out "hidden" victims, building relationships and trust with professionals and with children, gaining intelligence and submitting intelligence reports, raising awareness and providing training.
 - Targeting the kinds of groups, institutions and locations where victimisation is most likely to be occurring, or where professionals are well placed to identify children at risk and victims.
 - Door to door awareness about Child Exploitation
 - Delivering formal training and awareness raising to help equip professionals to recognise the risks and warning signs, and to report their concerns.

Operation Topaz – Andri Nicolaou A&S Police

Outreach work – Prevention and Coordination

- 1 January 2019 to 4 September 2019:
 - training for 210 non-police professionals in Bristol
 - awareness raising for in excess of 500 night-time economy workers and establishment owners in the City
 - awareness raising for 628 school students in Bristol.
- 2018:
 - training and awareness in Bristol for schools safeguarding leads; staff at a residential home for adolescent boys; staff at a community residential resource and activity centre; staff at a specialist gangs and youth violence unit, CSE and CCE services in Bristol; as well as night time economy workers in pubs and clubs.
 - Noted challenge of engaging independent children's homes providers.
- Working across city boundaries and into the wider Force Area
- Forthcoming events with Health and working with specific BAME groups to raise awareness of Child Exploitation.
